2016 RESULTS VS. LOS ANGELES

Seattle 66, Los Angeles 96 - STAPLES Center, Los Angeles, Calif. (5/15/16)

Despite 23 points from No. 1 draft pick Breanna Stewart in her WNBA debut, the Seattle Storm lost 96-66 to the Los Angeles Sparks on Sunday at STAPLES Center in its first game of the 2016 season. Led by forward Candace Parker, who finished with 34 points, the Sparks were in control throughout Sunday's game thanks to a dominant first half. They scored the first eight points of the game and led 25-16 after the first quarter despite seven points from Stewart. L.A. went on a 23-5 run to close out the second quarter, taking a 51-26 edge into the locker room. Stewart and Parker went back and forth in the third period, with the Seattle rookie scoring 13 of her 23 points to help close the gap. After scoring just 26 in the first half, the Storm put up 25 in the third quarter to pull within 14 heading into the fourth. Stewart finished an efficient 9-of-13 from the field, and the University of Connecticut product also recorded six rebounds, three assists and two steals. The 6-4 forward was one basket shy of the record for field goals made by a rookie. The Sparks increased their lead as the fourth quarter went on, due in part to Seattle's nine turnovers in the period. L.A. used full-court pressure for much of Sunday's contest, and the Storm finished with 24 turnovers compared to just 10 for the Sparks. In addition to Parker's game-high 34 points, forward Nneka Ogumike and guard Kristi Toliver were also in double figures for L.A. with 13 and 14 points, respectively. Reigning Rookie of the Year Jewell Loyd had a stellar game for Seattle, notching 20 points on 6-of-14 shooting with five assists. Stewart wasn't the only player to make her Storm debut on Sunday. Veteran guard Monica Wright, who was acquired midseason in 2015 but sat out due to injury, came off the bench and scored two points in seven minutes of action.

Seattle 79, Los Angeles 72 - KeyArena, Seattle, Wash. (8/26/16)

The Seattle Storm defeated the league-leading Los Angeles Sparks 79-72 on Friday at KeyArena. The Storm improves to 10-15 – which equals its win total from last season – and is now alone in the eighth and final playoff spot with nine games remaining. The Sparks drop to 21-4, still the best record in the WNBA. Crystal Langhorne led the Storm with 16 points Friday night, going 6-of-9 from the field and also pulling down 10 rebounds for her first double-double of the season. Jewell Loyd and Sue Bird scored 15 points apiece, and the starting guards dished out seven and six assists, respectively. Loyd recorded a season-high five steals, while Bird set a new season high for three-pointers, hitting five of her seven attempts from deep. The Storm was victorious despite leading scorer Breanna Stewart, the three-time Rookie of the Month, going 2-for-13 from the field for five points. Nneka Ogumike scored a game-high 28 points for the Sparks, but former MVP Candace Parker was held to just seven points after dropping 34 against Seattle in the season opener. Ogumike scored two baskets right away, but those were the only Sparks points of the opening five minutes, as Seattle held an 11-4 advantage. Bird was 3-for-3 from three-point range in the first quarter, helping the Storm extend its lead to as many as 11 and earn a 22-13 edge at the end of the period. Both teams struggled from the field to open the second, scoring just one basket apiece in the first 3:30 of the quarter. L.A. then went on a 10-0 run to cut its deficit to 26-25 with two minutes to go in the first half. The Storm led 31-28 at the break despite shooting 37.9 percent in the first half, including Stewart going 0-for-5. Seattle started the second half on a 12-2 run, increasing the lead to double digits again. Bird, who entered the game shooting a career-high 44.1 percent from deep, hit another trey during the dominant stretch in the third quarter. The Storm also benefitted from threes by reserves Noelle Quinn and Kaleena Mosqueda-Lewis, taking a 55-44 lead into the final quarter.

Seattle 78, Los Angeles 60 - KeyArena, Seattle, Wash. (9/11/16)

The Seattle Storm defeated the Los Angeles Sparks 78-60, clinching a spot in the playoffs with two games to spare. Seattle secured a postseason berth for the first time since 2013, improving to 15-17 and remaining in the seventh playoff spot heading into the final week of the regular season. The Storm has now earned four consecutive home wins and four straight victories overall, its longest winning streak since 2012. Seattle is 6-2 since Olympic break. All five starters scored in double figures for the Storm, led by the 20 points of rookie Breanna Stewart. Alysha Clark and Crystal Langhorne each poured in 15 points, with Langhorne also grabbing 10 boards for her second double-double of the year. Sue Bird had 12 points in addition to a game-high seven assists, while Jewell Loyd added 10 points. Candace Parker led the way with 20 points for the Sparks, who were held to their lowest scoring output of the season. Nneka Ogumike and Kristi Toliver, typical starters for L.A., did not play on Sunday. After going 16-of-16 at the foul line against Atlanta one week ago, the Storm hit all 18 of its free throws on Sunday, marking the second most foul shots without a miss in franchise history. Seattle also handily won the rebounding battle 40-24. The Storm created separation from the Sparks right away. Seattle got open looks on the perimeter and took advantage, as Bird, Stewart and Clark each drained a three-pointer in the first period. Stewart scored seven straight points, finishing the frame with nine as Seattle held a 28-15 edge. Langhorne was the catalyst early in the second quarter, scoring inside the paint as the Storm increased its lead to as many as 24. The second half was mostly an even battle, as the Storm shot much less efficiently and Parker's team continued to battle. Parker notched nine of her 20 points in the third frame, but Seattle always had a response on the other end of the court, maintaining a 22-point edge heading into the final quarter. The Storm had its biggest lead of the night, 58-32, midway through the third. Langhorne each scored a pair of baskets in the final minutes – three-pointers for Clark – to help Seattle hold off the second-place Sparks (24-8).

Seattle 55, Phoenix 72 - Talking Stick Resort Arena (5/7/17)

Early turnovers and a rough day from the field plagued the Seattle Storm in its preseason finale, as the team dropped a 72-55 decision to the Phoenix Mercury on Sunday evening at Talking Stick Resort Arena. Phoenix evened the all-time preseason series with Seattle at five games apiece, as Stephanie Talbot and Cayla George shared game-high honors with 16 points apiece. Seattle got off to a rocky start, missing its first four shots and committing five turnovers to fall behind by nine (13-4) in the first quarter. Meanwhile, Phoenix shot lights out in its preseason home opener, shooting 69.2 percent (9-for-13) and draining five early three's to take a 25-13 advantage into the second stanza. Things didn't get much better in the second quarter, as the Mercury surged to a 19-point (36-17) lead after Danielle Robinson knocked down a floater. Sami Whitcomb drained Seattle's first trey of the game to bridge the gap to 14 (36-22) at the 3:37 mark, but Phoenix ultimately took a 46-29 advantage into the locker room. The Storm shot just 34.8 percent (8-for-23) in the opening 20 minutes, compared to a 57.1 clip (16-for-28) by the Mercury. Much of the Mercury damage in the first half came by the way of Talbot, who scored 14 first-half points on a perfect 5-for-5 effort from the field, including three triples. In the third frame, rookie guard Alexis Peterson finished in the paint to cut the deficit to 15 (46-31), but the Storm never got closer for the rest of the way. Camille Little scored inside to kickstart a 17-8 Mercury run to stretch the lead to 24 (63-39), and the Storm's shooting woes continued with a 6-for-19 third-quarter clip. Phoenix swelled its lead to as many as 25 (72-47) with 6:03 left to play after Yvonne Turner netted two freebees at the line, and the Storm mustered an 8-0 run before the final buzzer sounded. Jewell Loyd led Seattle with 13 points and five boards, while Whitcomb came off the bench to drill three triples on the way to scoring 12 points. In addition, Jenna O'Hea dished out a team-high four assists.

Seattle 86, Phoenix 64 - KeyArena (5/3/17)

Newcomers Carolyn Swords and Sami Whitcomb tied game-high honors with 15 points apiece, and the Seattle Storm outscored Phoenix by 14 in the second half on the way to an 86-64 win over the Mercury in the preseason opener on Wednesday afternoon at KeyArena. While Swords spurted a 13-6 Seattle run to open the third with 11-straight points, Whitcomb played big for the Storm down the stretch, netting 12 points in the fourth frame to keep Phoenix at bay. Jewell Loyd added 14 points, including a 6-for-6 effort from the line, all of which came in the first half, while Crystal Langhorne recorded 10 points and six boards. Seattle took a two-point (19-17) advantage into the second quarter, and then Loyd scored the first five of the stanza, including a three at the buzzer of the shot clock, to launch a 16-9 run to put the Storm up by nine (35-26) with 2:56 left in the first half. Lanay Montgomery scored on a reverse layup, and then O'Neill swooshed a midrange jumper to help the Storm to a 39-31 lead at halftime. The third quarter started much like the first, as both teams traded multiple turnovers early before Seattle found its groove. Langhorne netted an 18-footer, and then Swords took over, scoring 11-straight points for Seattle to swell the gap to 15 (52-37) with 3:34 left in the stanza. Alysha Clark scored Seattle's next five, and then Whitcomb drained a triple in the right corner to cap the quarter and push the Storm's lead back to 15 (60-45). With 7:16 left to play, Jenna O'Hea snagged a defensive board before she tossed a full-court pass to Whitcomb for the lay-in to make it a 19-point (69-50) game, and Seattle led by as many as 27 (86-59) down the stretch to sail to victory. As a team, the Storm shot 46.3 percent (31-for-67) from the floor and owned a 37-25 advantage on the glass. Seattle also forced 23 turnovers and had 11 steals.

LAST GAME VS. TONIGHT'S OPPONENT

Seattle 78, Los Angeles 60 - KeyArena, Seattle, Wash. (9/11/16)

The Seattle Storm defeated the Los Angeles Sparks 78-60, clinching a spot in the playoffs with two games to spare. Seattle secured a postseason berth for the first time since 2013, improving to 15-17 and remaining in the seventh playoff spot heading into the final week of the regular season. The Storm has now earned four consecutive home wins and four straight victories overall, its longest winning streak since 2012. Seattle is 6-2 since Olympic break. All five starters scored in double figures for the Storm, led by the 20 points of rookie Breanna Stewart. Alysha Clark and Crystal Langhorne each poured in 15 points, with Langhorne also grabbing 10 boards for her second double-double of the year. Sue Bird had 12 points in addition to a game-high seven assists, while Jewell Loyd added 10 points. Candace Parker led the way with 20 points for the Sparks, who were held to their lowest scoring output of the season. Nneka Ogwumike and Kristi Toliver, typical starters for L.A., did not play on Sunday. After going 16-of-16 at the foul line against Atlanta one week ago, the Storm hit all 18 of its free throws on Sunday, marking the second most foul shots without a miss in franchise history. Seattle also handily won the rebounding battle 40-24. The Storm created separation from the Sparks right away. Seattle got open looks on the perimeter and took advantage, as Bird, Stewart and Clark each drained a three-pointer in the first period. Stewart scored seven straight points, finishing the frame with nine as Seattle held a 28-15 edge. Langhorne was the catalyst early in the second quarter, scoring inside the paint as the Storm increased its lead to as many as 24. The second half was mostly an even battle, as the Storm shot much less efficiently and Parker's team continued to battle. Parker notched nine of her 20 points in the third frame, but Seattle always had a response on the other end of the court, maintaining a 22-point edge heading into the final quarter. The Storm had its biggest lead of the night, 58-32, midway through the third. Langhorne each scored a pair of baskets in the final minutes - three-pointers for Clark - to help Seattle hold off the second-place Sparks (24-8).

PLAYER NOTES

PETERSON, MONTGOMERY HEAD WEST

In the 2017 WNBA Draft presented by State Farm, the Storm selected Alexis Peterson (15th pick, Syracuse) in the second round, followed by Lanay Montgomery (30th pick, West Virginia) in the third round. The all-time assist leader at Syracuse and reigning ACC Player of the Year, Peterson served as the floor general for the Orange, totaling 1,978 points and 590 assists to cap her career. Montgomery, a 6-5 center, averaged 10.6 points, 8.9 boards and 2.8 blocks per game in 2016-17 on the way to leading the Mountaineers to their first Big 12 Tournament title.

ANYTHING YOU CAN DO...

Breanna Stewart notched 2016 WNBA Rookie of the Year honors to cap her inaugural professional campaign and help Seattle become the first franchise in league history to garner back-to-back Rookie of the Year honorees (Jewell Loyd, 2015). In addition to posting 12 double-doubles, Stewart averaged a team-high 18.3 points and 9.3 rebounds to carry the Storm to its first playoff appearance since 2013.

BACK FOR SECONDS

In 2016, Breanna Stewart simply shattered the Storm's all-time rookie records, and the New York native is poised to carry the momentum over to her sophomore campaign. The reigning WNBA Rookie of the Year and All-WNBA Second Team selection, Stewart set Storm rookie records for points (621), field goals (208), rebounds (317) and minutes (1,179), and she also tied the single-season block record with 64. Stewart scored 20+ points in 15 games, including a historic, single-record tally of 38 vs. Atlanta on June 28, 2016.

SEATTLE ADDS A SWORD(S)

Seattle's frontline got a lot taller in late January thanks to the acquisition of 6-6 center Carolyn Swords. The Storm traded its sixth and 18th picks in the 2017 WNBA Draft with Washington to get the Boston College graduate out to Seattle. The Mystics, as part of the three-way swap, sent Kia Vaughn and Bria Hartley to New York. In her final season with the Liberty, Swords averaged a career-best 5.2 points and 4.6 rebounds per game while shooting 57 percent from the floor.

BIRD: RECORD WATCHING

Entering the 2017 campaign, Sue Bird sits only 19 steals away from reaching 600, as well as 477 points from becoming the eighth player in WNBA history to eclipse the 6,000-point total. The 36-year-old is the oldest active player in the league, and in her 16th season with the Storm, Bird needs only 189 more dimes to pass Ticha Penicheiro as the WNBA's career assist leader.

ONE OF THE ALL-TIME BEST DISHIN' THE ROCK

Sue Bird is just 188 assists shy of tying Ticha Penicheiro (2,599) on the WNBA all-time assist rankings. She boasts a 5.4 assist per game career average, sitting in second place on the all-time list. Bird led the league in dimes per game in 2016, dishing out 5.8 en route to the WNBA Peak Performer award in the category.

SHE'S A THIEF

Now in her 16th season in the WNBA, Sue Bird is eighth in career steals with 581. She averages 1.3 steals per game for her career, which included one season missed due to injury. In eight of the 14 years she played, Bird recorded 1.4 or more steals per contest. Her 579 career steals rank fourth among active players, and there's a good chance she moves up on the all-time list this year.

A SHINY, NEW JEWELL

Jewell Loyd's jump from her rookie campaign to year two in the WNBA paid dividends in Seattle's late-season push for its 11th playoff appearance in franchise history. Loyd's points-per-game average jumped 5.8 points (from 10.7 to 16.5), and she also nearly doubled her assist average to 3.4 per contest in 2016. Loyd's game-winner at Phoenix snapped a nine-game losing streak to the Mercury and gave Seattle its first win of the 2016 season, and she later netted a career-high 32 points in a 14-point win over the Mercury on June 3, 2016.

HOME, SWEET HOME

On Feb. 8, 2017, Seattle inked sharpshooter Sami Whitcomb to its training camp roster, allowing the former University of Washington standout to return to Seattle. With five years of international experience, Whitcomb has most recently played for the Perth Lynx in Australia, where she totaled 24.0 points, 5.4 rebounds and two assists per game. While playing for the Huskies during her college career, Whitcomb led the team in scoring (13.0 PPG), rebounds (5.6 RPG) and assists (2.5 APG).

STORM TRIO COLLECTS POSTSEASON AWARDS

Seattle boasted the most players on the 2016 All-WNBA First and Second Teams, highlighted by Sue Bird's first team recognition and recipient of the Peak Performer Award as the league leader in assists (5.8 per game). Breanna Stewart (18.3 PPG, 9.3 RPG) was named the 2016 Rookie of the Year, and both she and Jewell Loyd (16.5 PPG, 3.4 APG) earned second team recognition. Together, the trio accounted for nearly 59 percent of the team's offense and 66 percent of its team assists.

SCOUTING REPORT

Crystal Langhorne sits in third all-time on the WNBA's FG% charts. A career 56.3% shooter, Langhorne has led the Storm in scoring twice since joining the team and in consecutive seasons (2014, 2015).

HOT STARTS ARE HARD TO BEAT

In Seattle's two wins over Los Angeles in 2016, the Storm outscored the Sparks by a combined 50-28 margin in the opening stanza. Those hot starts ultimately paid dividends, and Seattle will look to do the same on Saturday. In first quarters vs. the Sparks since the 2015 campaign, the Storm is shooting nearly 45 percent from the floor, including a blistering 51.5 percent (17-for-33) clip in the two victories at home last season.

THE LAST TIME...

The last time Seattle defeated Los Angeles at the STAPLES Center came on August 11, 2015, as Crystal Langhorne led the way with 18 points, and the Storm overcame a 16-point second half deficit to win, 85-77. With 2:34 left to go, Langhorne scored inside to put Seattle up by two (76-74), and then Jenna O'Hea buried a triple on the Storm's next possession to seal it. Sue Bird added 15 points on 7-for-14 shooting to go along with five dimes, while Jewell Loyd, who was a rookie at the time, added 15 points and four boards.

STORM AT NO. 5 IN FIRST AP POWER POLL

The Associated Press (AP) released its preseason WNBA poll, and the Storm garnered a fifth-place ranking with 132 points. Last season, Seattle was ranked ninth entering the season.

REACHING NEW HEIGHTS

The Storm's 86 total points in the preseason opener vs. Phoenix set a franchise record for the most points tallied in a preseason game. After leading by only eight (39-31) at halftime, Seattle shot 51.3 percent (20-for-39) in the second half and outscored the Mercury by 14 in the final 20 minutes to seal an 86-64 victory. The home team was simply en fuego at the charity stripe with a 16-for-16 effort, and the Storm also won the rebounding battle, 37-25. Seattle improved to 19-25 in preseason games, including a 12-9 mark at KeyArena.

STORM SPLITS WITH MERCURY IN PRESEASON

The Storm split its 2017 preseason slate with the Phoenix Mercury, notching a 22-point (86-64) win in Seattle on May 3 before dropping a 17-point (72-55) decision on the road over the weekend. Jewell Loyd led Seattle offensively, averaging 13.5 points and shooting a perfect 10-for-10 from the free throw line. Adding a spark off the bench, Sami Whitcomb netted 27 total points in the two games combined, including a 6-for-14 effort from downtown.

LIGHTS, CAMERA, ACTION: SEATTLE HEADED FOR PRIMETIME IN HOLLYWOOD

Seattle's season opener at Los Angeles on Saturday, May 13 will air on ESPN at 2 p.m. PDT. The Storm took two of three from the Sparks last season and has won six of the last seven meetings. The Storm-Sparks matchup will kickoff a 16-game regular season schedule of the 2017 WNBA slate on ESPN. In addition, ESPN will televise each game of the WNBA postseason from the first round to the finals.

ROAD WARRIORS

Although five of Seattle's first six games in 2017 will take place inside the friendly confines of KeyArena, the Storm will face a brutal road slate in August that covers 21,374 miles across six road contests in five different states. Last season, the Storm dropped 10 of 13 road games before fighting back to win three of its last five.

HOT FINISH TO 2016

The Storm won five of its last six to cap the regular season in 2016 and earn the No. 7 seed in the WNBA Playoffs. Three of those triumphs came on the road, and Seattle won those five games by an average of 13.8 points. In Seattle's second to last home game, the Storm took down soon-to-be WNBA champion Los Angeles by an 18-point (78-60) margin, as Breanna Stewart led the way with her 15th 20+ point effort of the season.

JENNY BOUCEK BIOGRAPHY

JENNY BOUCEK

On Jan. 20, 2015, Jenny Boucek was named the fourth head coach in the history of the Seattle Storm and immediately set about rebuilding the team. In her two seasons at the helm, she coached consecutive WNBA Rookie of the Year winners in Jewell Loyd (2015) and Breanna Stewart (2016). Following a 10-24 campaign in 2015 with a roster that featured three rookies, Boucek's 2016 Storm improved to 16-18 for the franchise's first 15+ win season and playoff berth since 2013. Immediately prior to becoming the team's head coach, she spent four seasons with the Storm under then-head coach Brian Agler, rejoining the defending WNBA champions in 2010 as Dir. of Player Development and Scouting. She was promoted to associate head coach in 2014.

Boucek has been involved in the WNBA since it's inaugural season, suiting up for the Cleveland Rockers in 1997. Following a career-ending injury in 1998, she began her WNBA coaching career as an assistant with the Washington Mystics in 1999. She then spent three seasons, 2000-02, in the same capacity with the Miami Sol. Boucek enjoyed her first stint in Seattle on Anne Donovan's staff from 2003-05, a span which included the franchise's first WNBA Championship in 2004. Her first stop as a WNBA head coach came in Sacramento, leading the now-defunct Sacramento Monarchs to a 40-41 clip over two-plus seasons, spanning 2007-09.

Notably respected as one of the top coaches in the league, Boucek has spent much of her career as a student of the game. She served as an advanced scout with the Seattle SuperSonics, and more recently, had full access to Dallas Mavericks Head Coach Rick Carlisle's training camp in September and October of 2014. She was involved in all coaches meetings, film and practice sessions and player meetings.

Boucek also played in Iceland in 1998 and was voted the country's best player after averaging 23 points, seven rebounds and six assists. She returned to Cleveland for the 1998 season but was forced to retire due to a career-ending back injury.

A four-year starter at the University of Virginia (1992-96), Boucek helped lead the Cavaliers to four regular-season ACC Championships and three NCAA Elite Eight appearances. She was a two-time GTE Academic All-American team member and two-time ACC selection. Boucek twice earned team Defensive Player of the Year honors and finished her career at Virginia as a member of the 1,000-point club. She also competed in the U.S. Olympic Festival in 1993.
