- In the three contests against Washington, Breanna Stewart racked up 17.3 points, eight boards and 4.3 assists per game.

2016 RESULTS VS. WASHINGTON

Seattle 81, Washington 76 - Verizon Center, Washington D.C. (9/9/16)

The Seattle Storm picked up its third straight win defeating the Washington Mystics 81-76 to earn a crucial victory in its quest for a postseason berth. In a back-and-forth contest from start to finish, Seattle led 70-61 after Ramu Tokashiki scored seven straight points to start the final quarter. Washington pulled within a point midway through the quarter, and it remained a one-possession game down the stretch as the teams traded baskets. Jewell Loyd pushed Seattle's lead to 79-76 on a midrange jumper with 2:05 to go, and neither team scored again until Loyd's pair of free throws in the final seconds. Tayler Hill had a chance to tie for the Mystics, but her three-pointer rimmed out. Seattle won three out of four games on a successful road trip, improving to 5-2 since the Olympic break. Sue Bird and Breanna Stewart paced the Storm with 17 points apiece, as both finished 3-of-5 from behind the three-point line. Bird dished out nine assists and had a season-high seven rebounds, while Stewart grabbed 10 boards for her 11th double-double. Alysha Clark added 14 points on 6-of-8 shooting, and Tokashiki scored 13 to help Seattle's reserves outscore the highest-scoring bench in the league. The Mystics had shot 60.8 percent and scored a franchise-record 118 points in their previous game, yet Seattle held them to just 38.4 percent on Friday. Emma Meesseman scored a team-high 15 points. Turnovers plagued the Storm after its hot start, allowing Washington to climb back into the contest. Washington took its first lead of the night a minute into the second quarter, part of another 8-0 run to start the period until Clark ended it with her fourth bucket. Back-to-back baskets by Crystal Langhorne tied the game once again at 30 apiece. Bird scored or assisted on all of the final nine points of the half for Seattle, finishing the opening 20 minutes with 10 points and five assists as the Storm led 41-39 at the break. The Mystics took control early in the second half, using a 12-0 spurt to go in front 53-43 midway through the third quarter. Seattle responded with a run of its own, as Bird continued to find teammates for easy looks.

Seattle 80, Washington 51 - KeyArena, Seattle, Wash. (7/15/16)

Led by the 26 points of second-year guard Jewell Loyd, the Seattle Storm earned an 80-51 win over the Washington Mystics on Friday at KeyArena. It was the largest margin of victory this year for the Storm, which improves to 8-13 and evens the season series with Washington. Loyd shot 11-of-17 from the field on the way to 26 points, including 18 in the first half. Rookie forward Breanna Stewart had five assists in the first half, finishing the night with a team-high eight dimes along with 10 points and seven rebounds. Point guard Sue Bird had 12 points and seven assists, while Kaleena Mosqueda-Lewis came off the bench to score a season-high 12 points on four three-pointers. It was the eighth 20-point game of the season for Loyd, the reigning WNBA Rookie of the Year. Fellow second-year wing Mosqueda-Lewis has now hit at least two three-pointers in three of her last four games. As a team, the Storm recorded 20 assists, reaching 20 or more helpers for the fourth straight game. Emma Meesseman led the Mystics with a double-double of 16 points on 7-of-11 shooting and 10 rebounds. Loyd kept the Storm in control from there, finishing the quarter with 14 points on 6-of-8 shooting after hitting her first three jump shots. Seattle held a double-digit lead for much of the quarter and led 26-15 at its conclusion. The lead grew to 31-15 after two quick buckets to start the second frame. Washington then used an 8-0 run to climb back into the game, but the Mystics were unable to score in the final 5:28 of the first half. Mosqueda-Lewis nailed a pair of three-pointers, and Loyd continued to impose her will as the Storm took a 41-23 edge into the break. Loyd finished the half with 18 points, while the Mystics' 23 points came on 25.7 percent shooting. Bird scored six of her 12 points in the third quarter to help Seattle continue to increase its advantage. Seattle capped off the third quarter with an alley-oop layup from Stewart to Loyd. The Storm started hot in the fourth quarter, putting the game out of reach as a three-pointer by Mosqueda-Lewis and a Stewart layup extended the advantage to 70-42 in the opening minute.

Seattle 82, Washington 84 - KeyArena, Seattle, Wash. (5/26/16)

After erasing a 16-point deficit in the second half to force overtime, the Seattle Storm lost 84-82 to the Washington Mystics at KeyArena. Storm rookie forward Breanna Stewart scored a game and career-high 25 points to go along with seven rebounds, four blocks and four steals. Trailing by 16 with 3:24 to go in the third quarter, Seattle (1-3) marched back into the game behind Stewart and point guard Sue Bird, who notched 11 of her 15 points and four of her five assists in the second half. Bird found Jewell Loyd under the hoop for the game-tying layup with seven seconds to go that sent it to overtime. In the overtime period, Mystics guard Ivory Latta hit a corner three-pointer with 44 seconds remaining to give Washington a four-point lead. Stewart made a three-pointer of her own to make it 83-82 in the final seconds, but the Storm wasn't able to complete another comeback. Stewart shot 10-of-20 from the floor on her way to 25 points, which marks a season high for the No. 1 pick in the 2016 WNBA Draft. Alysha Clark scored 10 points and Crystal Langhorne added 10 against her former team, making it the third straight contest in which four Seattle players reached double figures. Washington initially built its lead through a 12-0 run spanning the end of the first quarter and the beginning of the second, and it held a 40-33 edge at the break. Before the Storm made its run to send the game to overtime, the Mystics used an 11-2 run to increase their lead to 16 late in the third quarter. In her season debut, Latta scored 16 off the bench for the Mystics, who improve to 2-3 with Thursday's victory. Emma Meesseman notched a team-high 19 points, and Tayler Hill added 18 to give Washington its first win at KeyArena since 2005. Storm forward Jenna O'Hea made her season debut Thursday night after missing the first three games. She scored six points in 14 minutes of action, including a three-pointer the first time she touched the ball. O'Hea was unavailable for the season opener and rested the previous two games due to concluding overseas commitments.

LAST GAME

Seattle 87, Indiana 82 - KeyArena (5/14/17)

Breanna Stewart buried the go-ahead three-pointer with less than two minutes remaining, and Jewell Loyd erupted for 27 points as the Seattle Storm muscled past Indiana, 87-82, in front of 7,969 fans at KeyArena on Opening Night presented by Swedish. The reigning WNBA Rookie of the Year and All-WNBA Second Team selection, Stewart made her return to the Storm lineup in the home opener, tallying 15 points and seven rebounds in 27 minutes of action. For the second-consecutive contest and eighth time in her career, Loyd eclipsed the 25-point mark, as she shot 10-for-18 from the floor and drained three triples. Both she and Stewart also tied team-high honors for rebounds with seven apiece. Causing most of her damage in the second half, Crystal Langhorne added 17 points on a blistering 7-for-8 shooting clip while Kaleena Mosqueda-Lewis registered 12 points off the bench, including a 6-for-6 effort at the line. With the win, Seattle (1-1) improved to 11-7 all-time in home openers, including a 9-3 mark since 2006. While Indiana still leads the all-time series, 18-16, the Storm improved to 12-5 vs. the Fever at KeyArena. Indiana (0-1) extended its advantage to as many as five (28-23) in the second until Seattle mustered a 14-6 spurt to end the quarter and take a 37-34 lead into the locker room. Stewart converted the and-one opportunity, Loyd connected on a three-pointer and then Mosqueda-Lewis found space inside for a layup to cap the Storm's scoring in the half. The Fever opened the third with four quick points, and the Storm responded with a 7-3 run capped by a left-handed finish by Alysha Clark. Loyd continued to exhibit a versatile offensive display, burying a midrange jumper before finishing at the rim to anchor a 10-0 run to stretch Seattle's lead to 12 (57-45), and the Storm entered the fourth with a 59-52 advantage. In the fourth, Indiana crawled to within five (59-54) before Seattle responded with 14 of the next 24 to go back up by nine (73-64), thanks in large part to Loyd, who attributed 10 points in the run. The Fever refused to go away, carding a 13-3 run to snag a one-point (77-76) edge after Mitchell scored inside. That's when Stewart made KeyArena erupt with a triple to put Seattle up two (79-77), and the Storm notched a defensive stop before Langhorne scored inside and Stewart came up with a big rejection to seal it.

PREVIOUS GAME

Seattle 68, Los Angeles 78 - Staples Center (5/13/17)

Despite shooting 52 percent from the field, Seattle couldn't overcome 23 turnovers in a 78-68 setback to Los Angeles in its season opener on Saturday afternoon at the STAPLES Center. The Sparks turned those miscues into 29 points, as Nneka Ogumike led the way with 23 points on 10-for-20 shooting. Jewell Loyd paced the Storm with a game-high 25 points, four dimes and four rebounds, while Ramu Tokashiki and Crystal Langhorne added 14 and 13 points, respectively. Trailing 9-8 in the first quarter, Loyd knocked down a triple to spark a 13-10 run to cap the quarter, as Seattle (0-1) connected on eight of its last 10 shots of the frame to take a one-point (21-20) lead. Loyd and Langhorne combined for 17 points in the quarter on eight-for-11 shooting, and the Storm also posted eight first-quarter assists. To open the second frame, Ramu Tokashiki netted two free throws before Noelle Quinn's extra pass found Sami Whitcomb in the left corner for the triple to extend Seattle's advantage to six (26-20). The Sparks responded with six unanswered points before Tokashiki and Loyd knocked down midrange jumpers to put the Storm back up by four (30-26). Seattle had trouble taking care of the ball, and Ogumike buried two threes amidst a 10-0 Sparks run to put Los Angeles on top, 36-30. But Loyd continued to keep the Storm close, scoring seven of the last nine to pull Seattle to within one (38-37) at the half. With the game tied at 47 apiece, the Sparks capped the third stanza with a 7-2 run, as Ogumike nailed a jumper in the final seconds of the quarter. Los Angeles (1-0) scored five quick points to open the fourth and stretch its lead to 10 (59-49), but Seattle responded with a 9-2 run to pull within three (59-56) after a jumper by Tokashiki. After Los Angeles went back up by seven (65-58), Quinn knocked down a three before Langhorne notched a three-point play the old fashioned way to cut the deficit to three (67-64). Chelsea Gray fired back with a three in the corner, and then Ogumike scored twice inside to start a 9-2 Sparks run to seal it for Los Angeles.

LAST GAME VS. TONIGHT'S OPPONENT

Seattle 81, Washington 76 - Verizon Center, Washington D.C. (9/9/16)

The Seattle Storm picked up its third straight win defeating the Washington Mystics 81-76 to earn a crucial victory in its quest for a postseason berth. In a back-and-forth contest from start to finish, Seattle led 70-61 after Ramu Tokashiki scored seven straight points to start the final quarter. Washington pulled within a point midway through the quarter, and it remained a one-possession game down the stretch as the teams traded baskets. Jewell Loyd pushed Seattle's lead to 79-76 on a midrange jumper with 2:05 to go, and neither team scored again until Loyd's pair of free throws in the final seconds. Tayler Hill had a chance to tie for the Mystics, but her three-pointer rimmed out. Sue Bird and Breanna Stewart paced the Storm with 17 points apiece, as both finished 3-of-5 from behind the three-point line. Bird dished out nine assists and had a season-high seven rebounds, while Stewart grabbed 10 boards for her 11th double-double. Alysha Clark added 14 points on 6-of-8 shooting, and Tokashiki scored 13 to help Seattle's reserves outscore the highest-scoring bench in the league. The Mystics had shot 60.8 percent and scored a franchise-record 118 points in their previous game, yet Seattle held them to just 38.4 percent on Friday. Washington took its first lead of the night a minute into the second quarter, part of another 8-0 run to start the period until Clark ended it with her fourth bucket. Back-to-back baskets by Crystal Langhorne tied the game once again at 30 apiece. Bird scored or assisted on all of the final nine points of the half for Seattle, finishing the opening 20 minutes with 10 points and five assists as the Storm led 41-39 at the break. The Mystics took control early in the second half, using a 12-0 spurt to go in front 53-43 midway through the third quarter. Seattle responded with a run of its own, as Bird continued to find teammates for easy looks.

PLAYER NOTES

PETERSON, MONTGOMERY HEAD WEST

In the 2017 WNBA Draft presented by State Farm, the Storm selected Alexis Peterson (15th pick, Syracuse) in the second round, followed by Lanay Montgomery (30th pick, West Virginia) in the third round. The all-time assist leader at Syracuse and reigning ACC Player of the Year, Peterson served as the floor general for the Orange, totaling 1,978 points and 590 assists to cap her career. Montgomery, a 6-5 center, averaged 10.6 points, 8.9 boards and 2.8 blocks per game in 2016-17 on the way to leading the Mountaineers to their first Big 12 Tournament title.

ANYTHING YOU CAN DO...

Breanna Stewart notched 2016 WNBA Rookie of the Year honors to cap her inaugural professional campaign and help Seattle become the first franchise in league history to garner back-to-back Rookie of the Year honorees (Jewell Loyd, 2015). In addition to posting 12 double-doubles, Stewart averaged a team-high 18.3 points and 9.3 rebounds to carry the Storm to its first playoff appearance since 2013.

BACK FOR SECONDS

In 2016, Breanna Stewart simply shattered the Storm's all-time rookie records, and the New York native is poised to carry the momentum over to her sophomore campaign. The reigning WNBA Rookie of the Year and All-WNBA Second Team selection, Stewart set Storm rookie records for points (621), field goals (208), rebounds (317) and minutes (1,179), and she also tied the single-season block record with 64. Stewart scored 20+ points in 15 games, including a historic, single-record tally of 38 vs. Atlanta on June 28, 2016.

SEATTLE ADDS A SWORD(S)

Seattle's frontline got a lot taller in late January thanks to the acquisition of 6-6 center Carolyn Swords. The Storm traded its sixth and 18th picks in the 2017 WNBA Draft with Washington to get the Boston College graduate out to Seattle. The Mystics, as part of the three-way swap, sent Kia Vaughn and Bria Hartley to New York. In her final season with the Liberty, Swords averaged a career-best 5.2 points and 4.6 rebounds per game while shooting 57 percent from the floor.

BIRD: RECORD WATCHING

Entering the 2017 campaign, Sue Bird sits only 19 steals away from reaching 600, as well as 477 points from becoming the eighth player in WNBA history to eclipse the 6,000-point total. The 36-year-old is the oldest active player in the league, and in her 16th season with the Storm, Bird needs only 189 more dimes to pass Ticha Penicheiro as the WNBA's career assist leader.

ONE OF THE ALL-TIME BEST DISHIN' THE ROCK

Sue Bird is just 188 assists shy of tying Ticha Penicheiro (2,599) on the WNBA all-time assist rankings. She boasts a 5.4 assist per game career average, sitting in second place on the all-time list. Bird led the league in dimes per game in 2016, dishing out 5.8 en route to the WNBA Peak Performer award in the category.

SHE'S A THIEF

Now in her 16th season in the WNBA, Sue Bird is eighth in career steals with 581. She averages 1.3 steals per game for her career, which included one season missed due to injury. In eight of the 14 years she played, Bird recorded 1.4 or more steals per contest. Her 579 career steals rank fourth among active players, and there's a good chance she moves up on the all-time list this year.

A SHINY, NEW JEWELL

Jewell Loyd's jump from her rookie campaign to year two in the WNBA paid dividends in Seattle's late-season push for its 11th playoff appearance in franchise history. Loyd's points-per-game average jumped 5.8 points (from 10.7 to 16.5), and she also nearly doubled her assist average to 3.4 per contest in 2016. Loyd's game-winner at Phoenix snapped a nine-game losing streak to the Mercury and gave Seattle its first win of the 2016 season, and she later netted a career-high 32 points in a 14-point win over the Mercury on June 3, 2016.

HOME, SWEET HOME

On Feb. 8, 2017, Seattle inked sharpshooter Sami Whitcomb to its training camp roster, allowing the former University of Washington standout to return to Seattle. With five years of international experience, Whitcomb has most recently played for the Perth Lynx in Australia, where she totaled 24.0 points, 5.4 rebounds and two assists per game. While playing for the Huskies during her college career, Whitcomb led the team in scoring (13.0 PPG), rebounds (5.6 RPG) and assists (2.5 APG).

STORM TRIO COLLECTS POSTSEASON AWARDS

Seattle boasted the most players on the 2016 All-WNBA First and Second Teams, highlighted by Sue Bird's first team recognition and recipient of the Peak Performer Award as the league leader in assists (5.8 per game). Breanna Stewart (18.3 PPG, 9.3 RPG) was named the 2016 Rookie of the Year, and both she and Jewell Loyd (16.5 PPG, 3.4 APG) earned second team recognition. Together, the trio accounted for nearly 59 percent of the team's offense and 66 percent of its team assists.

MIGHT WANT TO GUARD HER

Crystal Langhorne sits in second all-time on the WNBA's FG% charts. A career 56.5 percent shooter, Langhorne has led the Storm in scoring twice since joining the team and in consecutive seasons (2014, 2015).

PLAYER NOTES

MOVIN' ON UP

With a 5-for-7 effort from the field at Los Angeles on May 13, 2017, Crystal Langhorne moved to No. 2 all-time in the WNBA in field goal percentage, as she surpassed Nneka Ogumwike, who coincidentally guarded her for most of the game. Langhorne has made 56.5 (1512-2675) of her field goals and has shot 57 percent or higher for the season in five of the nine campaigns she has been a part of. In 2016, Langhorne led Seattle with a blistering 63 percent clip. In addition to climbing the WNBA record books, she also eclipsed the 1,400-defensive rebound club, as she pulled down six at Los Angeles to bump her career total, at the time, to 1,401.

FOURTH TIME'S A CHARM

For the fourth time in her career, Jewell Loyd netted at least 15 first-half points, as she posted 18 in the first half at Los Angeles on May 13, 2017. Loyd finished the contest with a game-high 25 points on 10-for-18 shooting, and she registered 13 20-point games last season, which ties for sixth all-time in franchise history. On June 3, 2016, she scored 19 in the first half vs. Phoenix en route to a career-high 32.

THE BIG 2-5

In the first two games of the 2017 campaign, Jewell Loyd recorded back-to-back games with at least 25 points, both of which she accomplished on 10-for-18 shooting. In the season opener at Los Angeles on May 13, 2017, Loyd booked a game-high 25 points in 33 minutes of action. Loyd is no stranger to success at the STAPLES Center, as she tallied 20 points in the team's season opener at Los Angeles a year ago. A mere 24 hours later, Loyd showed no signs of fatigue, netting a game-high 27 points in an 87-82 triumph over the Fever in the home opener to clinch her eighth-career game with 25 points or more.

STEWIE COMES IN CLUTCH

Breanna Stewart's late-game heroics were what ultimately sealed the deal for Seattle in its home-opening win vs. Indiana on May 14. Stewart grabbed a key offensive rebound before nailing the go-ahead three-pointer with 1:40 left to play, and she went on to drop a dime to Crystal Langhorne to make it a four-point game before coming up with a huge rejection at the 24.9 mark. In her 2017 debut, Stewart battled through foul trouble and registered 15 points and seven rebounds.

TEAM NOTES

WELCOME HOME

Since its inaugural WNBA season in 2000, the Storm is 11-7 in home openers, including an 9-3 mark in its last 12. Seattle has faced Los Angeles in seven of the 16 home openers, going 3-4 in those games.

REACHING NEW HEIGHTS

The Storm's 86 total points in the preseason opener vs. Phoenix set a franchise record for the most points tallied in a preseason game. After leading by only eight (39-31) at halftime, Seattle shot 51.3 percent (20-for-39) in the second half and outscored the Mercury by 14 in the final 20 minutes to seal an 86-64 victory. The home team was simply en fuego at the charity stripe with a 16-for-16 effort, and the Storm also won the rebounding battle, 37-25. Seattle improved to 19-25 in preseason games, including a 12-9 mark at KeyArena.

STORM SPLITS WITH MERCURY IN PRESEASON

The Storm split its 2017 preseason slate with the Phoenix Mercury, notching a 22-point (86-64) win in Seattle on May 3 before dropping a 17-point (72-55) decision on the road over the weekend. Jewell Loyd led Seattle offensively, averaging 13.5 points and shooting a perfect 10-for-10 from the free throw line. Adding a spark off the bench, Sami Whitcomb netted 27 total points in the two games combined, including a 6-for-14 effort from downtown.

ROAD WARRIORS

Although five of Seattle's first six games in 2017 will take place inside the friendly confines of KeyArena, the Storm will face a brutal road slate in August that covers 21,374 miles across six road contests in five different states. Last season, the Storm dropped 10 of 13 road games before fighting back to win three of its last five.

HOT FINISH TO 2016

The Storm won five of its last six to cap the regular season in 2016 and earn the No. 7 seed in the WNBA Playoffs. Three of those triumphs came on the road, and Seattle won those five games by an average of 13.8 points. In Seattle's second to last home game, the Storm took down soon-to-be WNBA champion Los Angeles by an 18-point (78-60) margin, as Breanna Stewart led the way with her 15th 20+ point effort of the season.

THE LAST TIME...

Should Seattle come up with a 'W' on Sunday against Washington, the team will muster its first 2-1 start since the 2011 season. The Storm has opened the campaign either 2-1 or 3-0 on 10 occasions during its 18-year history. In 2010, Seattle notched a 9-1 start on the way to going 35-6 and winning its second WNBA championship in franchise history.

STORM AT NO. 5 IN FIRST AP POWER POLL

The Associated Press (AP) released its preseason WNBA poll, and the Storm garnered a fifth-place ranking with 132 points. Last season, Seattle was ranked ninth entering the season.

DIALING THE MYSTICS' NUMBER

It's safe to say KeyArena hasn't been friendly to the Washington Mystics. Prior to 2016, Seattle enjoyed a 10-game winning streak at home vs. Washington, a stretch that dated back to the 2005 season. The Storm leads the all-time series, 19-13, but owns a 13-4 mark at home. Last season, Washington snapped that dry spell with an 84-82 upset in overtime, as the Mystics nearly blew a 14-point lead before the visiting foe edged Seattle in the extra frame, 13-11. Prior to that game, Washington hadn't beaten Seattle on the road since July 13, 2005. Seattle went on to defeat Washington twice last season by an average of 17 points. JENNY BOUCEK

On Jan. 20, 2015, Jenny Boucek was named the fourth head coach in the history of the Seattle Storm and immediately set about rebuilding the team. In her two seasons at the helm, she coached consecutive WNBA Rookie of the Year winners in Jewell Loyd (2015) and Breanna Stewart (2016).

Following a 10-24 campaign in 2015 with a roster that featured three rookies, Boucek's 2016 Storm improved to 16-18 for the franchise's first 15+ win season and playoff berth since 2013. Immediately prior to becoming the team's head coach, she spent four seasons with the Storm under then-head coach Brian Agler, rejoining the defending WNBA champions in 2010 as Dir. of Player Development and Scouting. She was promoted to associate head coach in 2014.

Boucek has been involved in the WNBA since it's inaugural season, suiting up for the Cleveland Rockers in 1997. Following a career-ending injury in 1998, she began her WNBA coaching career as an assistant with the Washington Mystics in 1999. She then spent three seasons, 2000-02, in the same capacity with the Miami Sol. Boucek enjoyed her first stint in Seattle on Anne Donovan's staff from 2003-05, a span which included the franchise's first WNBA Championship in 2004. Her first stop as a WNBA head coach came in Sacramento, leading the now-defunct Sacramento Monarchs to a 40-41 clip over two-plus seasons, spanning 2007-09.

Notably respected as one of the top coaches in the league, Boucek has spent much of her career as a student of the game. She served as an advanced scout with the Seattle SuperSonics, and more recently, had full access to Dallas Mavericks Head Coach Rick Carlisle's training camp in September and October of 2014. She was involved in all coaches meetings, film and practice sessions and player meetings.

Boucek also played in Iceland in 1998 and was voted the country's best player after averaging 23 points, seven rebounds and six assists. She returned to Cleveland for the 1998 season but was forced to retire due to a career-ending back injury.

A four-year starter at the University of Virginia (1992-96), Boucek helped lead the Cavaliers to four regular-season ACC Championships and three NCAA Elite Eight appearances. She was a two-time GTE Academic All-American team member and two-time ACC selection. Boucek twice earned team Defensive Player of the Year honors and finished her career at Virginia as a member of the 1,000-point club. She also competed in the U.S. Olympic Festival in 1993.
