- Alysha Clark scored a career-high 23 points against New York last season.
- Tonight, Carolyn Swords faces her former team. She played two seasons for the Liberty (2015-16), averaging just over five points and 4.3 rebounds per game during her stint in New York.

## 2016 RESULTS VS. NEW YORK

Seattle 102, New York 78 - Madison Square Garden, New York, New York (9/7/16)

Entering its current road trip, the Seattle Storm hadn't beaten Atlanta or New York on the road since the 2010 title-winning season. Three days after defeating the Dream, the Storm had one of its best outings of the season in a 102-78 win. Seattle reached 100 points for the first time since 2012. The Storm (13-17) is tied with Phoenix for the seventh playoff spot with four games remaining. Not only was it Seattle's first win at New York since 2010, but the victory also snapped an eight-game losing streak against the Liberty that dated back to 2012. Seattle won the rebounding battle 41-31 against a New York team that leads the league in rebounding percentage. The Storm dominated the second half, thanks in large part to the play of its two young stars. Jewell Loyd had a game-high 25 points, while Breanna Stewart finished with 23 points, nine rebounds and three blocks. Crystal Langhorne returned to the starting lineup after missing one game due to injury, and she added 21 points on 10-of-12 shooting and nine boards. Sue Bird dished out a game-high eight assists and scored 12 points. Loyd is now averaging 20.5 points per game since the Olympic break. Tina Charles paced New York with 22 points. Loyd was aggressive early on, scoring nine quick points on 4-of-5 shooting. Both teams started with hot shooting in the opening minutes. The Storm never trailed the rest of the game. Stewart nailed a three-pointer to make it 36-28, forcing a New York timeout early in the second quarter. But the Liberty responded with an 8-0 run, including a pair of treys by Sugar Rodgers, to tie the game. Loyd and Stewart each recorded 12 points in the first half, while Langhorne had nine points on 4-of-5 shooting, and the Storm took a 48-46 edge into the break. Clark and Langhorne each had a pair of buckets in the opening minutes of the second half, and the Storm lead was increased to double digits on a Bird three-pointer. Langhorne, who ranks among the all-time leaders in field goal percentage, went 5-of-5 in the third quarter to help Seattle maintain a sizeable advantage. Her layup made it a 78-66 edge heading into the final period.

Seattle 74, New York 78 - Madison Square Gardens, New York, NY (7/6/16)

After nearly overcoming an 18-point deficit the Seattle Storm lost 78-74 to the New York Liberty at Madison Square Garden. Rookie Breanna Stewart recorded 24 points and 16 rebounds as Seattle dropped to 6-12 on the season. New York had a comfortable lead for most of the contest, but the Storm rallied in the fourth quarter and pulled within two at the 1:14 mark on one of Stewart's four three-pointers. Neither team was able to score until Storm guard Sue Bird was fouled with four seconds to go. Bird made her first free throw but missed the second, the Liberty secured the rebound, and Tanisha Wright drained a pair of free throws to make it 77-74. New York's Sugar Rodgers stole the ensuing inbounds pass and added a free throw to clinch the victory. Wright and Tina Charles paced the Liberty (13-6) with 18 points apiece, while Rodgers added 14 and seven assists. Stewart, who shot 9-for-18 from the field, notched her second straight double-double and her seventh of the season. Bird added to her league-leading assist total by notching 10 helpers Wednesday night, tying her season high. Second-year wing Kaleena Mosqueda-Lewis scored a season-high 10 points off the bench. Seattle kept it close in the opening minutes, but New York jumped out to a double-digit lead late in the first quarter as Rodgers and Charles started to take control. It was the second straight low-scoring first quarter for the Storm, which managed 11 points Wednesday night while New York put up 23 on 57.9 percent shooting. After trailing 31-13 early in the second, Seattle climbed back into the game thanks to four three-pointers, including two from Stewart. The Storm went on an 11-2 spurt to trim the deficit to single digits, sparked by threes from Stewart and Mosqueda-Lewis. Stewart scored nine of her 12 first-half points in the second frame, and New York led by just six at halftime. Rodgers, who leads the league in three-pointers this season, hit a trio of them in the opening minutes of the second half. New York extended its lead to double digits again, and it took a 64-54 edge into the fourth quarter before Stewart and company nearly completed their comeback.

Seattle 78, New York 86 - KeyArena, Seattle, Wash. (6/5/16)

After trimming a 17-point deficit to just three late in the fourth quarter, the Seattle Storm wasn't able to complete the comeback, falling 86-78 to the New York Liberty on Sunday at KeyArena. Veteran forward Alysha Clark scored a career-high 23 points on 7-of-7 shooting for the Storm, which drops to 3-5 on the season with Sunday's defeat. Seattle forward Breanna Stewart set the franchise's rookie record for rebounds in a game with 17, while Sue Bird recorded a double-double with 13 points and a season-high 10 assists. New York was paced by forward Tina Charles and guard Sugar Rodgers, who scored 19 and 18 points, respectively. The teams played a very even opening half, as there were nine lead changes and neither club had more than a five-point advantage. Clark, who returned to the starting lineup after coming off the bench Friday due to a right knee bruise, was 5-for-5 in the first half to lead Seattle with 14 points. Ramu Tokashiki added 10 first-half points off the bench on her way to a season-high 15, while Charles finished the half with 13 points after missing her first three shot attempts. Coming off a career-high 32 points against Phoenix, Storm guard Jewell Loyd took just two shots in the first half and even had a rare miss at the free throw line. Loyd and Stewart, who went to the bench with her third foul early in the second quarter, combined for just five points in the first half and 11 in the game. New York held a 46-45 edge at the break, then proceeded to go on an 11-2 run early in the third quarter behind two baskets apiece from Swin Cash and Sugar Rodgers. The Liberty continued to dominate the period and opened up a 17-point lead, outscoring Seattle 26-13 in the third. Trailing by 14 to start the fourth quarter, the Storm used a 13-2 spurt midway through the period to cut its deficit to five behind seven of Clark's game-high 23 points. New York's lead was just three with 3:45 remaining after another Clark jumper, but Rodgers made four free throws down the stretch to help the Liberty hold on. The Storm shot just 5-of-22 from three-point range on Sunday, and New York dominated the glass by outrebounding Seattle 40-31.

## LAST GAME

### Seattle 81, Washington 71 - KeyArena (5/21/17)

Jewell Loyd scored a game-high 26 points, including her 1,000th for her career in the second half, as the Seattle Storm used a big push in the third quarter to defeat Washington, 81-71, on Sunday evening at KeyArena. Loyd netted at least 25 points and hit at least 10 field goals for the third-straight contest, as she went 10-for-14, including 3-for-3 from downtown. The Storm (2-1) improved to 14-4 at home against the Mystics, including an 11-1 mark since 2006. After falling behind by one midway through the third quarter, Loyd and Seattle took off, as the Storm scored 31 of the next 42 points to put the Mystics away. Crystal Langhorne added 17 points on 6-for-9 shooting, while Loyd, Breanna Stewart, and Alysha Clark each grabbed five boards apiece. In her 2017 debut, Sue Bird just missed a double-double with nine points and 10 assists, as she picked up right where she left off last season when she earned All-WNBA First-Team honors. Seattle hit its first three shots from the floor to take an 8-3 lead, as Loyd knocked down back-to-back treys before Bird netted her first bucket of the 2017 season. Anchored by eight early points from Elena Delle Donne, Washington clawed its way back to get within two (17-15) before Seattle responded with a 7-0 run to go up eight (25-17). Loyd was simply unstoppable in the opening quarter, going a perfect 5-for-5 for 13 points to lead the Storm to a 29-23 advantage going into the second frame. Seattle's 29 first-quarter points was a season high for a quarter, as the Storm went 11-for-15 from the field for a 73.3 percent clip. The Mystics (1-2) held the Storm to only two field goals in the opening six minutes of the second and charged to a 35-33 advantage before Langhorne capped a three-point play to spark a 9-2 burst, as Bird dropped a dime to Langhorne and then knocked down a triple to make it a 42-37 game. In the final moments of the second stanza, Bird tossed an alley-oop to Loyd to notch her sixth assist of the half, and Seattle led at the break, 44-41. Langhorne scored Seattle's first four points of the third, as Seattle overcome a slow start to the second half to eventually take control. The Storm closed the period with a 13-0 run, as Loyd led the way with six points during the spurt, including her 1,000th for her career via a step-back jumper with 31.9 seconds left. Loyd swooshed a baseline jumper to make it a 74-56 contest with 6:10 left. Stewart dropped a dime to Langhorne and then scored on the run to swell the lead to 19 (79-60), and the Mystics closed the affair with an 11-2 run before falling by 10.

Breanna Stewart buried the go-ahead three-pointer with less than two minutes remaining, and Jewell Loyd erupted for 27 points as the Seattle Storm muscled past Indiana, 87-82, in front of 7,969 fans at KeyArena on Opening Night presented by Swedish. Stewart made her return to the Storm lineup in the home opener, tallying 15 points and seven rebounds in 27 minutes of action. For the second-consecutive contest and eighth time in her career, Loyd eclipsed the 25-point mark, as she shot 10-for-18 from the floor and drained three triples. Both she and Stewart also tied team-high honors for rebounds with seven apiece. Causing most of her damage in the second half, Crystal Langhorne added 17 points on a blistering 7-for-8 shooting clip while Kaleena Mosqueda-Lewis registered 12 points off the bench, including a 6-for-6 effort at the line. With the win, Seattle (1-1) improved to 11-7 all-time in home openers, including a 9-3 mark since 2006. While Indiana still leads the all-time series, 18-16, the Storm improved to 12-5 vs. the Fever at KeyArena. Indiana (0-1) extended its advantage to as many as five (28-23) in the second until Seattle mustered a 14-6 spurt to end the quarter and take a 37-34 lead into the locker room. Stewart converted the and-one opportunity, Loyd connected on a three-pointer and then Mosqueda-Lewis found space inside for a layup to cap the Storm's scoring in the half. Loyd continued to exhibit a versatile offensive display, burying a midrange jumper before finishing at the rim to anchor a 10-0 run to stretch Seattle's lead to 12 (57-45), and the Storm entered the fourth with a 59-52 advantage. In the fourth, Indiana crawled to within five (59-54) before Seattle responded with 14 of the next 24 to go back up by nine (73-64), thanks in large part to Loyd, who attributed 10 points in the run. The Fever refused to go away, carding a 13-3 run to snag a one-point (77-76) edge after Mitchell scored inside. That's when Stewart made KeyArena erupt with a triple to put Seattle up two (79-77), and the Storm notched a defensive stop before Langhorne scored inside and Stewart came up with a big rejection to seal it.

## LAST GAME VS. TONIGHT'S OPPONENT

### Seattle 102, New York 78 - Madison Square Garden, New York, New York (9/7/16)

Entering its current road trip, the Seattle Storm hadn't beaten Atlanta or New York on the road since the 2010 title-winning season. Three days after defeating the Dream, the Storm had one of its best outings of the season in a 102-78 win. Seattle reached 100 points for the first time since 2012. Not only was it Seattle's first win at New York since 2010, but the victory also snapped an eight-game losing streak against the Liberty that dated back to 2012. Seattle won the rebounding battle 41-31 against a New York team that leads the league in rebounding percentage. The Storm dominated the second half, thanks in large part to the play of its two young stars. Jewell Loyd had a game-high 25 points, while Breanna Stewart finished with 23 points, nine rebounds and three blocks. Crystal Langhorne returned to the starting lineup after missing one game due to injury, and she added 21 points on 10-of-12 shooting and nine boards. Both teams started with hot shooting in the opening minutes. The Storm never trailed the rest of the game. Stewart nailed a three-pointer to make it 36-28, forcing a New York timeout early in the second quarter. But the Liberty responded with an 8-0 run, including a pair of treys by Sugar Rodgers, to tie the game. Loyd and Stewart each recorded 12 points in the first half, while Langhorne had nine points on 4-of-5 shooting, and the Storm took a 48-46 edge into the break. Clark and Langhorne each had a pair of buckets in the opening minutes of the second half, and the Storm lead was increased to double digits on a Bird three-pointer. Langhorne, who ranks among the all-time leaders in field goal percentage, went 5-of-5 in the third quarter to help Seattle maintain a sizeable advantage. Her layup made it a 78-66 edge heading into the final period.

## PLAYER NOTES

### PETERSON, MONTGOMERY HEAD WEST

In the 2017 WNBA Draft presented by State Farm, the Storm selected Alexis Peterson (15th pick, Syracuse) in the second round, followed by Lanay Montgomery (30th pick, West Virginia) in the third round. The all-time assist leader at Syracuse and reigning ACC Player of the Year, Peterson served as the floor general for the Orange, totaling 1,978 points and 590 assists to cap her career. Montgomery, a 6-5 center, averaged 10.6 points, 8.9 boards and 2.8 blocks per game in 2016-17 on the way to leading the Mountaineers to their first Big 12 Tournament title.

### ANYTHING YOU CAN DO...

Breanna Stewart notched 2016 WNBA Rookie of the Year honors to cap her inaugural professional campaign and help Seattle become the first franchise in league history to garner back-to-back Rookie of the Year honorees (Jewell Loyd, 2015). In addition to posting 12 double-doubles, Stewart averaged a team-high 18.3 points and 9.3 rebounds to carry the Storm to its first playoff appearance since 2013.

### BACK FOR SECONDS

In 2016, Breanna Stewart simply shattered the Storm's all-time rookie records, and the New York native is poised to carry the momentum over to her sophomore campaign. The reigning WNBA Rookie of the Year and All-WNBA Second Team selection, Stewart set Storm rookie records for points (621), field goals (208), rebounds (317) and minutes (1,179), and she also tied the single-season block record with 64. Stewart scored 20+ points in 15 games, including a historic, single-record tally of 38 vs. Atlanta on June 28, 2016.

### SEATTLE ADDS A SWORD(S)

Seattle's frontline got a lot taller in late January thanks to the acquisition of 6-6 center Carolyn Swords. The Storm traded its sixth and 18th picks in the 2017 WNBA Draft with Washington to get the Boston College graduate out to Seattle. The Mystics, as part of the three-way swap, sent Kia Vaughn and Bria Hartley to New York. In her final season with the Liberty, Swords averaged a career-best 5.2 points and 4.6 rebounds per game while shooting 57 percent from the floor.

### BIRD: RECORD WATCHING

Entering the 2017 campaign, Sue Bird sits only 19 steals away from reaching 600, as well as 477 points from becoming the eighth player in WNBA history to eclipse the 6,000-point total. The 36-year-old is the oldest active player in the league, and in her 16th season with the Storm, Bird needs only 189 more dimes to pass Ticha Penicheiro as the WNBA's career assist leader.

### ONE OF THE ALL-TIME BEST DISHIN' THE ROCK

Sue Bird is just 178 assists shy of tying Ticha Penicheiro (2,599) on the WNBA all-time assist rankings. She boasts a 5.4 assist per game career average, sitting in second place on the all-time list. Bird led the league in dimes per game in 2016, dishing out 5.8 en route to the WNBA Peak Performer award in the category.

### SHE'S A THIEF

Now in her 16th season in the WNBA, Sue Bird is eighth in career steals with 581. She averages 1.3 steals per game for her career, which included one season missed due to injury. In eight of the 14 years she played, Bird recorded 1.4 or more steals per contest. Her 579 career steals rank fourth among active players, and there's a good chance she moves up on the all-time list this year.

### A SHINY, NEW JEWELL

Jewell Loyd's jump from her rookie campaign to year two in the WNBA paid dividends in Seattle's late-season push for its 11th playoff appearance in franchise history. Loyd's points-per-game average jumped 5.8 points (from 10.7 to 16.5), and she also nearly doubled her assist average to 3.4 per contest in 2016. Loyd's game-winner at Phoenix snapped a nine-game losing streak to the Mercury and gave Seattle its first win of the 2016 season, and she later netted a career-high 32 points in a 14-point win over the Mercury on June 3, 2016.

### HOME, SWEET HOME

On Feb. 8, 2017, Seattle inked sharpshooter Sami Whitcomb to its training camp roster, allowing the former University of Washington standout to return to Seattle. With five years of international experience, Whitcomb has most recently played for the Perth Lynx in Australia, where she totaled 24.0 points, 5.4 rebounds and two assists per game. While playing for the Huskies during her college career, Whitcomb led the team in scoring (13.0 PPG), rebounds (5.6 RPG) and assists (2.5 APG).

### STORM TRIO COLLECTS POSTSEASON AWARDS

Seattle boasted the most players on the 2016 All-WNBA First and Second Teams, highlighted by Sue Bird's first team recognition and recipient of the Peak Performer Award as the league leader in assists (5.8 per game). Breanna Stewart (18.3 PPG, 9.3 RPG) was named the 2016 Rookie of the Year, and both she and Jewell Loyd (16.5 PPG, 3.4 APG) earned second team recognition. Together, the trio accounted for nearly 59 percent of the team's offense and 66 percent of its team assists.

### MIGHT WANT TO GUARD HER

Crystal Langhorne sits tied for second all-time on the WNBA's FG% charts. A career 56.6 percent shooter, Langhorne has led the Storm in scoring twice since joining the team and in consecutive seasons (2014, 2015).

## PLAYER NOTES

### MOVIN' ON UP

With a 5-for-7 effort from the field at Los Angeles on May 13, 2017, Crystal Langhorne moved to No. 2 all-time in the WNBA in field goal percentage, as she surpassed Nneka Ogumwike, who coincidentally guarded her for most of the game. She is currently tied with Brittney Griner from Phoenix. Langhorne has made 56.6 (1518-2684) of her field goals and has shot 57 percent or higher for the season in five of the nine campaigns she has been a part of. In 2016, Langhorne led Seattle with a blistering 63 percent clip. In addition to climbing the WNBA record books, she also eclipsed the 1,400-defensive rebound club, as she pulled down six at Los Angeles to boost her career total, at the time, to 1,401.

### EN FUEGO FROM THE GET-GO

For the fifth time in her career on May 21 against Washington, Jewell Loyd netted at least 15 first-half points, as she posted 17 points in 16 minutes on 6-for-8 shooting, including a 2-for-2 effort from downtown. In the season opener at Los Angeles on May 13, she scored 18 in the first half and finished the contest with a game-high 25 points on 10-for-18 shooting. She registered 13 20-point games last season, which ties for sixth all-time in franchise history. On June 3, 2016, she scored 19 in the first half vs. Phoenix en route to a career-high 32.

### LOYD REACHES A MILESTONE...ALREADY

On May 21 against Washington at KeyArena, Jewell Loyd scored her 1,000th-career point in just her third pro season. The bucket came amidst a furious Seattle run in the third quarter, as she nailed a step-back jumper with 31.9 seconds left. The former Notre Dame standout has simply changed the complexion of the Storm this season, averaging 26 points per game and shooting 60 percent (30-for-50) from the field.

### THE BIG 2-5

In the first three games of the 2017 campaign, Jewell Loyd recorded at least 25 points in each contest, all of which she accomplished on 55.6 percent shooting or better. She hit 10 field goals in each game, and on May 21 vs. Washington, she went 10-for-14 from the floor for a 71.4 percent clip. In the season opener at Los Angeles on May 13, Loyd booked a game-high 25 points in 33 minutes of action. Loyd is no stranger to success at the STAPLES Center, as she tallied 20 points in the team's season opener at Los Angeles a year ago. A mere 24 hours later, Loyd showed no signs of fatigue, netting a season-high 27 points in an 87-82 triumph over the Fever. Loyd has now scored at least 25 points nine times during her career.

### STEWIE COMES IN CLUTCH

Breanna Stewart's late-game heroics were what ultimately sealed the deal for Seattle in its home-opening win vs. Indiana on May 14. Stewart grabbed a key offensive rebound before nailing the go-ahead three-pointer with 1:40 left to play, and she went on to drop a dime to Crystal Langhorne to make it a four-point game before coming up with a huge rejection at the 24.9 mark. In her 2017 debut, Stewart battled through foul trouble and registered 15 points and seven rebounds.

### RETURNING TO THE NEST

In her 16th season with the Storm, Sue Bird made her return to the lineup on May 21 against the Washington Mystics after missing the first two games of the season. A 2016 All-WNBA First Team selection, Bird picked up right where she left off from last season, tallying nine points and a game-high 10 assists in 29 minutes of action. At age 36, Bird is the oldest active player in the league. She has never come off the bench during her career and has appeared in 448 games.

## TEAM NOTES

### HOT FINISH TO 2016

The Storm won five of its last six to cap the regular season in 2016 and earn the No. 7 seed in the WNBA Playoffs. Three of those triumphs came on the road, and Seattle won those five games by an average of 13.8 points. In Seattle's second to last home game, the Storm took down soon-to-be WNBA champion Los Angeles by an 18-point (78-60) margin, as Breanna Stewart led the way with her 15th 20+ point effort of the season.

### WELCOME HOME

Since its inaugural WNBA season in 2000, the Storm is 11-7 in home openers, including an 9-3 mark in its last 12. Seattle has faced Los Angeles in seven of the 16 home openers, going 3-4 in those games.

### REACHING NEW HEIGHTS

The Storm's 86 total points in the preseason opener vs. Phoenix set a franchise record for the most points tallied in a preseason game. After leading by only eight (39-31) at halftime, Seattle shot 51.3 percent (20-for-39) in the second half and outscored the Mercury by 14 in the final 20 minutes to seal an 86-64 victory. The home team was simply en fuego at the charity stripe with a 16-for-16 effort, and the Storm also won the rebounding battle, 37-25. Seattle improved to 19-25 in preseason games, including a 12-9 mark at KeyArena.

### STORM SPLITS WITH MERCURY IN PRESEASON

The Storm split its 2017 preseason slate with the Phoenix Mercury, notching a 22-point (86-64) win in Seattle on May 3 before dropping a 17-point (72-55) decision on the road over the weekend. Jewell Loyd led Seattle offensively, averaging 13.5 points and shooting a perfect 10-for-10 from the free throw line. Adding a spark off the bench, Sami Whitcomb netted 27 total points in the two games combined, including a 6-for-14 effort from downtown.

### ROAD WARRIORS

Although five of Seattle's first six games in 2017 will take place inside the friendly confines of KeyArena, the Storm will face a brutal road slate in August that covers 21,374 miles across six road contests in five different states. Last season, the Storm dropped 10 of 13 road games before fighting back to win three of its last five.

### SEATTLE HITS BIG APPLE BY STORM

In last season's 102-78 thumping over New York on the road on September 7, 2016, Seattle tied a franchise high with 40 field goals made, as Jewell Loyd led the way with 24 points on 9-for-14 shooting, while Crystal Langhorne went 10-for-12 with 21 points. Seattle's 102 points tied for second best all-time behind 111 points, which the Storm has achieved three times in its 18-year history.

### STORM JUMPS TO NO. 3 IN AP POWER POLL

In the second Associated Press (AP) Power Poll, and the Storm jumped to third behind defending champion Los Angeles and Minnesota. In the preseason poll, Seattle was ranked fifth.

### DUE FOR A 'W' VS. THE LIBERTY

While Seattle owns a 9-7 record all-time vs. New York at KeyArena, the Storm hasn't topped the Liberty in the Emerald City since the 2012 campaign. Prior to dropping four straight vs. New York, Seattle had won eight in a row at home against the Eastern Conference foe, a winning streak that dated back to 2005. The last four meetings against New York at KeyArena have been decided by an average of 5.3 points, including a four-point overtime loss on July 24, 2014. However, the Storm notched its second-largest win of the 2016 campaign on the road at New York with a 102-78 win, as Jewell Loyd led the way with 25 points.

## JENNY BOUCEK BIOGRAPHY

### JENNY BOUCEK

On Jan. 20, 2015, Jenny Boucek was named the fourth head coach in the history of the Seattle Storm and immediately set about rebuilding the team. In her two seasons at the helm, she coached consecutive WNBA Rookie of the Year winners in Jewell Loyd (2015) and Breanna Stewart (2016).

Following a 10-24 campaign in 2015 with a roster that featured three rookies, Boucek's 2016 Storm improved to 16-18 for the franchise's first 15+ win season and playoff berth since 2013. Immediately prior to becoming the team's head coach, she spent four seasons with the Storm under then-head coach Brian Agler, rejoining the defending WNBA champions in 2010 as Dir. of Player Development and Scouting. She was promoted to associate head coach in 2014.

Boucek has been involved in the WNBA since it's inaugural season, suiting up for the Cleveland Rockers in 1997. Following a career-ending injury in 1998, she began her WNBA coaching career as an assistant with the Washington Mystics in 1999. She then spent three seasons, 2000-02, in the same capacity with the Miami Sol. Boucek enjoyed her first stint in Seattle on Anne Donovan's staff from 2003-05, a span which included the franchise's first WNBA Championship in 2004. Her first stop as a WNBA head coach came in Sacramento, leading the now-defunct Sacramento Monarchs to a 40-41 clip over two-plus seasons, spanning 2007-09.

Notably respected as one of the top coaches in the league, Boucek has spent much of her career as a student of the game. She served as an advanced scout with the Seattle SuperSonics, and more recently, had full access to Dallas Mavericks Head Coach Rick Carlisle's training camp in September and October of 2014. She was involved in all coaches meetings, film and practice sessions and player meetings.

Boucek also played in Iceland in 1998 and was voted the country's best player after averaging 23 points, seven rebounds and six assists. She returned to Cleveland for the 1998 season but was forced to retire due to a career-ending back injury.

A four-year starter at the University of Virginia (1992-96), Boucek helped lead the Cavaliers to four regular-season ACC Championships and three NCAA Elite Eight appearances. She was a two-time GTE Academic All-American team member and two-time ACC selection. Boucek twice earned team Defensive Player of the Year honors and finished her career at Virginia as a member of the 1,000-point club. She also competed in the U.S. Olympic Festival in 1993.
