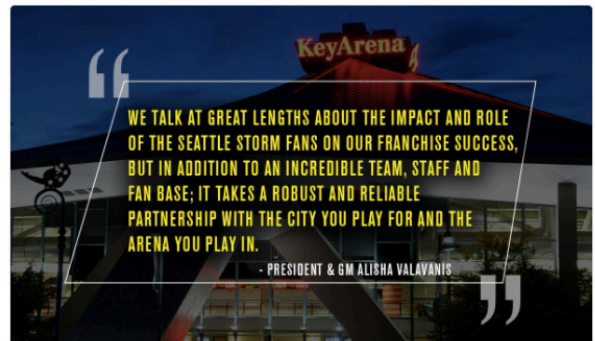

## SERIES NOTES

- The last Storm win over the Lynx came in Sept. 11 2015, when Kaleena Mosqueda-Lewis and Jewell Loyd tallied a combined 30 points en route to a 78-64 victory. The team is 1-8 vs. the Lynx over the last two seasons (2016, 2015).
- Vintage Basketball: At 36, Sue Bird is the oldest active player in the WNBA, followed by the Lynx's Plenette Pierson (35), Rebekkah Brunson (35) and Jia Perkins (35)

## 2016 VS. MINNESOTA

Seattle 72, Minnesota 79 - Target Center, Minneapolis, Minn. (7/22/16)

The Seattle Storm lost 79-72 to the defending champion Minnesota Lynx at the Target Center. Rookie forward Breanna Stewart paced Seattle with 18 points and eight rebounds, but finished just 3-for-14 from the field. Jewell Loyd and Sue Bird added 16 points apiece for the Storm. Maya Moore and Sylvia Fowles scored 21 and 20 points for the Lynx, respectively. Minnesota improved to 3-0 this year against the Storm. Minnesota led 11-9 at the 3:30 mark in the first quarter. But a three-pointer by Keisha Hampton broke the tie and started a 12-4 run for the Lynx, who were sparked by eight first quarter points from Fowles. The reigning Finals MVP was dominant in the paint, going 3-for-3 from the field and hitting both of her free throws in the opening frame. Fowles continued to score at will for Minnesota, but it remained a one or two-possession game the rest of the half and the Lynx took a 38-36 edge into the locker room. Loyd knocked down a pair of jumpers, including one from beyond the arc, to keep the Storm within striking distance early in the third quarter. Their lead was 64-51 heading into the fourth quarter. The strong run for Minnesota extended to 14-2 at the start of the fourth, and the lead was 17 before Kaleena Mosqueda-Lewis nailed a three-pointer for Seattle. It was trimmed to single digits with 2:48 remaining, but Seattle never got closer than seven the rest of the way.

Seattle 84, Minnesota 96 - KeyArena, Seattle, Wash. (6/19/16)

Returning home from a four-game road trip, the Seattle Storm fell 96-84 to the defending champion Minnesota Lynx at KeyArena on Sunday. The Storm, on just two days of rest after the road trip, drops to 4-9 on the season, while the Lynx extend their record-breaking undefeated start to 12 games. Rookie forward Breanna Stewart paced the Storm with 21 points and nine rebounds, while Jewell Loyd added 20 points and a career-high seven assists. Minnesota, which leads the WNBA with 87.8 points per game, was paced by the 18 points of former MVP Maya Moore. The Lynx dominated on the glass Sunday night, outrebounding Seattle 35-21. They were also bolstered by the production of their bench, which tallied 38 points to Seattle's 10. It was Minnesota's eighth win by a double-digit margin this season. The Lynx led 53-46 at the break after both teams shot better than 54 percent from the field. Stewart picked up her third foul with five minutes to go in the second, and she sat on the bench for the remainder of the half. Bird drained two consecutive three-pointers to start the second half, helping the Storm come back to tie the game at 55. But Moore guided Minnesota to a timely 16-3 run, and the Lynx never relinquished the lead from there. Ahead 77-63 heading into the fourth quarter, Minnesota maintained a double-digit lead throughout the final period despite 10 points from Stewart. The Storm is now 0-2 this year against Minnesota, with two road games vs. the Lynx still to come.

Seattle 71, Minnesota 78 - KeyArena, Seattle WA. (5/22/16)

Despite a career-high 20 points from forward Alysha Clark, the Seattle Storm fell 78-71 to the defending WNBA champion Minnesota Lynx in front of 9,686 fans at KeyArena in its home opener on Sunday. Coming off its first victory of the season on Friday, the Storm (1-2) started with a stellar first quarter on Sunday, outscoring Minnesota 24-19 with rookie forward Breanna Stewart leading the way with nine points. After scoring four points combined in the first two games, Clark had seven in the first quarter and would go on to pass her previous career high of 14 early in the fourth quarter. Stewart finished with 14 points and a game-high 13 rebounds, while Loyd added 14 points and Sue Bird notched 12 points with nine assists. Sunday's game marked the second straight contest that four Seattle players reached double figures. It was a very slow start to the second half for both teams, as Seattle and Minnesota combined for just 18 points in the third quarter. The Lynx led 54-51 heading into the final period, and point guard Lindsay Whalen led the way in the fourth quarter with seven points to help Minnesota hold on for its third straight victory to start the season. The Lynx were held to by far their lowest scoring output of the season, as they had put up 97 and 95 points in their first two games.

Seattle 80, Minnesota 92 -Target Center (8/28/16)

Two days after defeating the league-leading Los Angeles Sparks, the Seattle Storm went toe-to-toe with the defending champion Minnesota Lynx on Sunday at the Target Center. Seattle led at halftime and kept pace with Minnesota in the third quarter, but the Lynx pulled away for a 92-80 win. The Storm drops to 10-16 and is tied for the eighth and final playoff spot with eight games remaining. Five players scored in double figures for Seattle, led by the 20 points of Jewell Loyd on 8-of-17 shooting. Ramu Tokashiki had 13 points – two shy of her season high – while Sue Bird and Crystal Langhorne each scored 11. Breanna Stewart added 10 points for the Storm, which finishes 0-4 against Minnesota in the regular season. In a game featuring half of the gold-medal winning USA women's basketball team, Olympian Lindsay Whalen led all scorers with 24 points for the Lynx. Fellow Olympian Seimone Augustus added 18 points.

## LAST GAME

### Seattle 94, Indiana 70 - KeyArena (5/28/17)

Alysha Clark scored 22 points and made her first nine shots from the floor to set a franchise record for most makes without a miss, and the Seattle Storm bumped its winning streak to four games with a 94-70 victory over Indiana on Sunday night at KeyArena. With the win, Seattle improved to 13-5 all-time vs. the Fever at home, and the Storm earned two wins against Indiana at KeyArena for the first time in franchise history. In addition, the Storm's 94 points set a franchise record for points scored against the Fever. Jewell Loyd added 13 points and five assists, while both Crystal Langhorne and Breanna Stewart registered 12 points apiece. Sue Bird dished out a game-high eight assists to go along with six points, and Sami Whitcomb came off the bench to chip in nine points on three triples. Clark paced the Storm's offense in the opening 10 minutes, breaking her season high with 12 points on a perfect 4-for-4 shooting, including her first trey of the 2017 campaign. Seattle started the game 4-for-6 and notched points from five different players on the way to jumping to a 13-4 lead at the 5:51 mark. Tiffany Mitchell recorded a pair of steals and scored six of Indiana's next eight to trim Seattle's lead to four (18-14) with 2:49 left, but Clark scored inside and then logged two at the line to keep the Storm in front. Seattle opened the second quarter on fire, scoring nine unanswered to take a 35-22 lead. Ramu Tokashiki found Carolyn Swords connected inside on the high-low play, and Whitcomb made a three on the right wing to spark the run. With 6:24 left in the first half, Bird nailed a floater to cap the run and force a Fever timeout. The Storm led by as many as 14 (39-25) in the first half after a turn-around jumper by Stewart, and the Fever got as close as nine before Seattle took a 47-34 lead into halftime. The Storm (4-1) set a season-high for points in a first half with 47, as the team shot 62.1 percent (18-29), including a 5-for-5 effort from Clark, who entered the contest firing at just a 30.4 percent clip. Indiana (2-3) pulled to within 12 (50-38) before Seattle netted seven unanswered in a 65-second stretch, and the Storm used a total-team effort later in the stanza to anchor a 7-0 run to make it 72-49, as Whitcomb swooshed a three and then Tokashiki put in two at the line. Mitchell paced Indiana with 13 points on 5-for-11 shooting, while Dupree and Natalie Achonwa added 11 and 10 points, respectively.

## PREVIOUS GAME

### Seattle 87, New York 81 - KeyArena (5/26/17)

Former University of Washington standout Sami Whitcomb exploded for a career-high 22 points in the second half, and the Seattle Storm overcame a 10-point deficit on the way to cashing in an 87-81 win over New York on Friday night at KeyArena. Seattle improved to 3-1 on the year to notch its best start since 2010, and the Storm earned its first win over New York at home since 2012. Whitcomb simply changed the complexion of the game in the final 15 minutes, burying three triples in the third quarter to spark a major Storm comeback. The rookie finished with a team-high 22 points on 6-for-8 shooting from deep. Breanna Stewart added 20 points and 12 boards to book her 13th-career double-double, while Jewell Loyd missed the 20-point mark for the first time in 2017 but still came away with 16 points, including a 7-for-9 effort from the line. Down 24-19 in the second, the Storm mustered a 12-3 run, sparked in large part by Stewart, who notched a block, three pointer and two free throws to give Seattle a 31-27 advantage at the 6:16 mark. After the Liberty took a 37-35 edge with a bucket inside by Kiah Stokes, Stewart and Loyd combined to go 5-for-6 at the charity stripe to put the Storm back up three (40-37). Tina Charles netted 13 New York's first 18 of the third quarter, as the Liberty charged to a 62-53 advantage at the 3:44 mark. For a moment, Seattle looked dead in the water before Whitcomb entered the contest, drilling three triples to cut the deficit to five (70-65) entering the fourth frame. Whitcomb did her damage in the final 2:31 of the quarter, teaming up with Bird to net two late three's to bring the crowd to its feet. Whitcomb swooshed yet another triple in the corner to grant the Storm its first lead (76-74) since the 7:53 mark of the third quarter. With three's being contagious, Rodgers buried two straight for New York to put the Liberty back on top, 81-78. Four free throws by Stewart helped the Storm regain a one-point (82-81) edge, and with 56 seconds left, Whitcomb dribbled off a screen and popped another three-pointer to make it a four-point (85-81) contest. Seattle muscled back-to-back defensive stops, and Whitcomb snagged a defensive board before she netted two at the line to swell the lead to six (87-81) at the 23.5 mark.

## LAST GAME VS. TONIGHT'S OPPONENT

### Seattle 80, Minnesota 92 - Target Center (8/28/16)

Two days after defeating the league-leading Los Angeles Sparks, the Seattle Storm went toe-to-toe with the defending champion Minnesota Lynx on Sunday at the Target Center. Seattle led at halftime and kept pace with Minnesota in the third quarter, but the Lynx pulled away for a 92-80 win. The Storm drops to 10-16 and is tied for the eighth and final playoff spot with eight games remaining. Five players scored in double figures for Seattle, led by the 20 points of Jewell Loyd on 8-of-17 shooting. Ramu Tokashiki had 13 points - two shy of her season high - while Sue Bird and Crystal Langhorne each scored 11. Breanna Stewart added 10 points for the Storm, which finishes 0-4 against Minnesota in the regular season. In a game featuring half of the gold-medal winning USA women's basketball team, Olympian Lindsay Whalen led all scorers with 24 points for the Lynx. Fellow Olympian Seimone Augustus added 18 points. Sylvia Fowles scored six points as part of an 11-0 start for Minnesota in the first quarter, and the Lynx maintained a double-digit edge late in the frame. But Loyd scored nine of her 20 points in the quarter, helping the Storm climb back into the game. Seattle then started the second quarter with a dominant run of its own, a 12-4 spurt boosted by eight straight points from Tokashiki. The Storm led 33-30 at that point and would hold a 47-42 advantage at halftime after closing the quarter on a 7-0 run. After a 26-15 second quarter in favor of the Storm, the third period was just the opposite. Minnesota outscored Seattle 32-18 as Whalen started to impose her will. The teams went back-and-forth with a number of lead changes early in the quarter, and Minnesota took its first lead of the half on a Whalen layup four minutes in. The Lynx used an 11-2 spurt to take a 73-65 edge into the final frame. Whalen scored eight of her 24 points in the final 10 minutes, helping Minnesota maintain a sizeable lead throughout the quarter.

## PLAYER NOTES

### PETERSON, MONTGOMERY HEAD WEST

In the 2017 WNBA Draft presented by State Farm, the Storm selected Alexis Peterson (15th pick, Syracuse) in the second round, followed by Lanay Montgomery (30th pick, West Virginia) in the third round. The all-time assist leader at Syracuse and reigning ACC Player of the Year, Peterson served as the floor general for the Orange, totaling 1,978 points and 590 assists to cap her career. Montgomery, a 6-5 center, averaged 10.6 points, 8.9 boards and 2.8 blocks per game in 2016-17 on the way to leading the Mountaineers to their first Big 12 Tournament title.

### ANYTHING YOU CAN DO...

Breanna Stewart notched 2016 WNBA Rookie of the Year honors to cap her inaugural professional campaign and help Seattle become the first franchise in league history to garner back-to-back Rookie of the Year honorees (Jewell Loyd, 2015). In addition to posting 12 double-doubles, Stewart averaged a team-high 18.3 points and 9.3 rebounds to carry the Storm to its first playoff appearance since 2013.

### BACK FOR SECONDS

In 2016, Breanna Stewart simply shattered the Storm's all-time rookie records, and the New York native is poised to carry the momentum over to her sophomore campaign. The reigning WNBA Rookie of the Year and All-WNBA Second Team selection, Stewart set Storm rookie records for points (621), field goals (208), rebounds (317) and minutes (1,179), and she also tied the single-season block record with 64. Stewart scored 20+ points in 15 games, including a historic, single-record tally of 38 vs. Atlanta on June 28, 2016.

### SEATTLE ADDS A SWORD(S)

Seattle's frontline got a lot taller in late January thanks to the acquisition of 6-6 center Carolyn Swords. The Storm traded its sixth and 18th picks in the 2017 WNBA Draft with Washington to get the Boston College graduate out to Seattle. The Mystics, as part of the three-way swap, sent Kia Vaughn and Bria Hartley to New York. In her final season with the Liberty, Swords averaged a career-best 5.2 points and 4.6 rebounds per game while shooting 57 percent from the floor.

### BIRD: RECORD WATCHING

Entering Saturday's contest, Sue Bird sits only 15 steals away from reaching 600, as well as 453 points from becoming the eighth player in WNBA history to eclipse the 6,000-point total. The 36-year-old is the oldest active player in the league, and in her 16th season with the Storm, Bird needs only 165 more dimes to pass Ticha Penicheiro as the WNBA's career assist leader.

### ONE OF THE ALL-TIME BEST DISHIN' THE ROCK

Sue Bird is just 164 assists shy of tying Ticha Penicheiro (2,599) on the WNBA all-time assist rankings. She boasts a 5.4 assist per game career average, sitting in second place on the all-time list. Bird led the league in dimes per game in 2016, dishing out 5.8 en route to the WNBA Peak Performer award in the category.

### SHE'S A THIEF

Now in her 16th season in the WNBA, Sue Bird is eighth in career steals with 585. She averages 1.3 steals per game for her career, which included one season missed due to injury. In eight of the 14 years she played, Bird recorded 1.4 or more steals per contest. Her 585 career steals rank fourth among active players, and there's a good chance she moves up on the all-time list this year.

### A SHINY, NEW JEWELL

Jewell Loyd's jump from her rookie campaign to year two in the WNBA paid dividends in Seattle's late-season push for its 11th playoff appearance in franchise history. Loyd's points-per-game average jumped 5.8 points (from 10.7 to 16.5), and she also nearly doubled her assist average to 3.4 per contest in 2016. Loyd's game-winner at Phoenix snapped a nine-game losing streak to the Mercury and gave Seattle its first win of the 2016 season, and she later netted a career-high 32 points in a 14-point win over the Mercury on June 3, 2016.

### HOME, SWEET HOME

On Feb. 8, 2017, Seattle inked sharpshooter Sami Whitcomb to its training camp roster, allowing the former University of Washington standout to return to Seattle. With five years of international experience, Whitcomb has most recently played for the Perth Lynx in Australia, where she totaled 24.0 points, 5.4 rebounds and two assists per game. While playing for the Huskies during her college career, Whitcomb led the team in scoring (13.0 PPG), rebounds (5.6 RPG) and assists (2.5 APG).

### STORM TRIO COLLECTS POSTSEASON AWARDS

Seattle boasted the most players on the 2016 All-WNBA First and Second Teams, highlighted by Sue Bird's first team recognition and recipient of the Peak Performer Award as the league leader in assists (5.8 per game). Breanna Stewart (18.3 PPG, 9.3 RPG) was named the 2016 Rookie of the Year, and both she and Jewell Loyd (16.5 PPG, 3.4 APG) earned second team recognition. Together, the trio accounted for nearly 59 percent of the team's offense and 66 percent of its team assists.

### MIGHT WANT TO GUARD HER

Crystal Langhorne sits tied for fourth all-time on the WNBA's FG% charts. A career 56.5 percent shooter, Langhorne has led the Storm in scoring twice since joining the team and in consecutive seasons (2014, 2015).

## PLAYER NOTES

### EN FUEGO FROM THE GET-GO

For the fifth time in her career on May 21 against Washington, Jewell Loyd netted at least 15 first-half points, as she posted 17 points in 16 minutes on 6-for-8 shooting, including a 2-for-2 effort from downtown. In the season opener at Los Angeles on May 13, she scored 18 in the first half and finished the contest with a game-high 25 points on 10-for-18 shooting. She registered 13 20-point games last season, which ties for sixth all-time in franchise history. On June 3, 2016, she scored 19 in the first half vs. Phoenix en route to a career-high 32.

### LOYD REACHES A MILESTONE...ALREADY

On May 21 against Washington at KeyArena, Jewell Loyd scored her 1,000th-career point in just her third pro season. The bucket came amidst a furious Seattle run in the third quarter, as she nailed a step-back jumper with 31.9 seconds left. The former Notre Dame standout has simply changed the complexion of the Storm this season, averaging 26 points per game and shooting 60 percent (30-for-50) from the field.

### RETURNING TO THE NEST

In her 16th season with the Storm, Sue Bird made her return to the lineup on May 21 against the Washington Mystics after missing the first two games of the season. A 2016 All-WNBA First Team selection, Bird picked up right where she left off from last season, tallying nine points and a game-high 10 assists in 29 minutes of action. At age 36, Bird is the oldest active player in the league.

### LOYD'S 3-POINT REVOLUTION

It's no question that Jewell Loyd's shooting ability has improved significantly since her rookie season. In fact, it took just five games for the former Notre Dame superstar to surpass her three-point field goal total from her rookie campaign. In 2015, Loyd went 10-for-48 from deep for 20.8 percent. This season, she has already made 11 on just 19 attempts for a 57.9 percent clip. Loyd is well on pace to beat last season's total of 40.

### THE BIG 2-5

In the first three games of the 2017 campaign, Jewell Loyd recorded at least 25 points in each contest, all of which she accomplished on 55.6 percent shooting or better. She hit 10 field goals in each game, and on May 21 vs. Washington, she went 10-for-14 from the floor for a 71.4 percent clip. In the season opener at Los Angeles on May 13, Loyd booked a game-high 25 points. A mere 24 hours later, Loyd netted a season-high 27 points in an 87-82 triumph over the Fever. Loyd has now scored at least 25 points nine times during her career.

### STEWIE COMES IN CLUTCH

Breanna Stewart's late-game heroics were what ultimately sealed the deal for Seattle in its home-opening win vs. Indiana on May 14. Stewart grabbed a key offensive rebound before nailing the go-ahead three-pointer with 1:40 left to play, and she went on to drop a dime to Crystal Langhorne to make it a four-point game before coming up with a huge rejection at the 24.9 mark. Stewart battled through foul trouble and registered 15 points and seven rebounds.

### WHITCOMB'S 15 MINUTES OF FAME

Prior to the May 26 meeting with New York, Sami Whitcomb had only seen action in a total of nine minutes. But Seattle needed the former University of Washington to defeat the Liberty, as she scored 22 second-half points to anchor a big Storm comeback from 10 down. Whitcomb buried six treys during that stretch, which tied a WNBA record for the most three's made by a player in one half.

## TEAM NOTES

### HOT FINISH TO 2016

The Storm won five of its last six to cap the regular season in 2016 and earn the No. 7 seed in the WNBA Playoffs. Three of those triumphs came on the road, and Seattle won those five games by an average of 13.8 points. In Seattle's second to last home game, the Storm took down soon-to-be WNBA champion Los Angeles by an 18-point (78-60) margin, as Breanna Stewart led the way with her 15th 20+ point effort of the season.

### WELCOME HOME

Since its inaugural WNBA season in 2000, the Storm is 11-7 in home openers, including an 9-3 mark in its last 12. Seattle has faced Los Angeles in seven of the 16 home openers, going 3-4 in those games.

### REACHING NEW HEIGHTS

The Storm's 86 total points in the preseason opener vs. Phoenix set a franchise record for the most points tallied in a preseason game. After leading by only eight (39-31) at halftime, Seattle shot 51.3 percent (20-for-39) in the second half and outscored the Mercury by 14 in the final 20 minutes to seal an 86-64 victory. The home team was simply en fuego at the charity stripe with a 16-for-16 effort, and the Storm also won the rebounding battle, 37-25. Seattle improved to 19-25 in preseason games, including a 12-9 mark at KeyArena.

### STORM SPLITS WITH MERCURY IN PRESEASON

The Storm split its 2017 preseason slate with the Phoenix Mercury, notching a 22-point (86-64) win in Seattle on May 3 before dropping a 17-point (72-55) decision on the road over the weekend. Jewell Loyd led Seattle offensively, averaging 13.5 points and shooting a perfect 10-for-10 from the free throw line. Adding a spark off the bench, Sami Whitcomb netted 27 total points in the two games combined, including a 6-for-14 effort from downtown.

### ROAD WARRIORS

Although five of Seattle's first six games in 2017 will take place inside the friendly confines of KeyArena, the Storm will face a brutal road slate in August that covers 21,374 miles across six road contests in five different states. Last season, the Storm dropped 10 of 13 road games before fighting back to win three of its last five.

### BACK ABOVE .500

With an 81-71 win over Washington on May 21, the Storm moved above .500 for the first time since June 6, 2015. Seattle had posted losing records in both 2015 and 2016, and with a win over the Liberty on Friday, the Storm will be off to its best start since the 2010 campaign.

### FREE POINTS MAKE A DIFFERENCE

If Seattle has proved anything thus far in 2017, it's that it can beat teams at the charity stripe. In the home opener vs. Indiana on May 14, the Storm outscored the Fever by 11 at the line. Freebees came up big two weeks later in a showdown with New York, as Seattle outscored the Liberty, 25-10, at the line to seal an 87-81 win.

### STORM JUMPS TO NO. 2 IN AP POWER POLL

In the third Associated Press (AP) Power Poll, and the Storm jumped to second behind top-ranked Minnesota. In the preseason poll, Seattle was ranked fifth.

### IN ORDER TO BE THE BEST...

Saturday's affair vs. Minnesota provides a matchup between the top two teams in the latest AP Power Poll. Since the 2011 campaign when Minnesota won its first WNBA title, the Lynx have simply set the standard for a dynasty, claiming three championships in six years. Seattle has struggled against the Lynx during that stretch, posting a 5-20 record. However, prior to 2011, the Storm had the Lynx's number, going 22-15, including 15-4 at KeyArena. Seattle's last win against the Lynx was Sept. 11, 2015, (78-64 at KeyArena), and the team is 1-8 vs. the Lynx over the last two seasons (2016, 2015).

## TEAM NOTES

### THE POWER OF THREE

In Seattle's 87-81 win over New York on May 26, the Storm matched a franchise high with 14 three-pointers on 14-for-28 shooting. Nine of those 14 came in the second half, as Sami Whitcomb came off the bench to net six treys, which tied a WNBA record for the most three's made in a half by a single player. The last time Seattle hit at least 14 treys came on Sept. 6, 2012 against Tulsa.

### BEST START SINCE 2010

The Storm is enjoying its first 4-1 start since the 2010 campaign, the same year the team went on to win its second WNBA title. In addition, Seattle is off to a 4-0 start at KeyArena, which it also hasn't accomplished since 2010. After dropping a 10-point decision to the Sparks, Seattle averaged 87.3 points in its next four games.

### SETTING A STANDARD ON OFFENSE

As of May 31, Seattle currently ranks in the top three in five statistical categories on the offensive end, including:

- #1** field goal percentage (49.8)
- #2** points per game (83.4)
- #2** free throw percentage (87.4)
- #3** three-point field goal percentage (39.8)
- #3** assists per game (18.4)

### TAKING CARE OF THE ROCK

After committing 43 turnovers in its first two contests of the 2017 campaign, the Storm has only averaged 12.3 in its last three home wins over Washington (May 21), New York (May 26) and Indiana (May 28). Coincidentally, Sue Bird made her return to the lineup when Seattle's miscues went down, showing just how important the 16-year veteran is to the team.

### CLICKING ON ALL CYLINDERS

Seattle accomplished quite a few feats when it toppled Indiana by a 94-70 margin on May 28. The Storm tied a franchise record for the best single-game field goal percentage (61.4), earned two wins vs. the Fever at KeyArena for the first time and tied a franchise record for the most points (94) scored against Indiana.

### ANY GIVEN NIGHT...

Seattle head coach Jenny Boucek pointed out that any player on the Storm roster can explode on any given night, and that has certainly been the indication this season. In a come-from-behind win over New York on May 26, Sami Whitcomb erupted for 22 points, all of which came in the second half. Two days later, Alysha Clark scored a season-high 22 points in a 24-point win over Indiana. While she didn't earn game-high honors, Crystal Langhorne has booked two 17-point performances in 2017, and Jewell Loyd has led the team in scoring on three occasions.

### JENNY BOUCEK

On Jan. 20, 2015, Jenny Boucek was named the fourth head coach in the history of the Seattle Storm and immediately set about rebuilding the team. In her two seasons at the helm, she coached consecutive WNBA Rookie of the Year winners in Jewell Loyd (2015) and Breanna Stewart (2016).

Following a 10-24 campaign in 2015 with a roster that featured three rookies, Boucek's 2016 Storm improved to 16-18 for the franchise's first 15+ win season and playoff berth since 2013. Immediately prior to becoming the team's head coach, she spent four seasons with the Storm under then-head coach Brian Agler, rejoining the defending WNBA champions in 2010 as Dir. of Player Development and Scouting. She was promoted to associate head coach in 2014.

Boucek has been involved in the WNBA since it's inaugural season, suiting up for the Cleveland Rockers in 1997. Following a career-ending injury in 1998, she began her WNBA coaching career as an assistant with the Washington Mystics in 1999. She then spent three seasons, 2000-02, in the same capacity with the Miami Sol. Boucek enjoyed her first stint in Seattle on Anne Donovan's staff from 2003-05, a span which included the franchise's first WNBA Championship in 2004. Her first stop as a WNBA head coach came in Sacramento, leading the now-defunct Sacramento Monarchs to a 40-41 clip over two-plus seasons, spanning 2007-09.

Notably respected as one of the top coaches in the league, Boucek has spent much of her career as a student of the game. She served as an advanced scout with the Seattle SuperSonics, and more recently, had full access to Dallas Mavericks Head Coach Rick Carlisle's training camp in September and October of 2014. She was involved in all coaches meetings, film and practice sessions and player meetings.

Boucek also played in Iceland in 1998 and was voted the country's best player after averaging 23 points, seven rebounds and six assists. She returned to Cleveland for the 1998 season but was forced to retire due to a career-ending back injury.

A four-year starter at the University of Virginia (1992-96), Boucek helped lead the Cavaliers to four regular-season ACC Championships and three NCAA Elite Eight appearances. She was a two-time GTE Academic All-American team member and two-time ACC selection. Boucek twice earned team Defensive Player of the Year honors and finished her career at Virginia as a member of the 1,000-point club. She also competed in the U.S. Olympic Festival in 1993.
