SERIES NOTES

- In the last meeting between these two squads on June 13, the Storm fell 91-86 in overtime at Key Arena. In that game, Jewell Loyd led the way for the storm with 27 points, while Damiris Dantas netted 22 for Atlanta.
- Breanna Stewart's career-high 38 points came last year when the Dream visited KeyArena on June 28, 2016. The Storm won the contest, 84-81.
- Last year, these two teams met in the first round of last year's WNBA Playoffs, when the Dream bounced the seventh-seeded Storm, 94-85.
- With the five-point win on June 13, the Dream earned its first win at KeyArena since July 11, 2012.
- Tonight's contest is a rematch of the 2010 WNBA Finals, when the Storm beat the Dream in a 3-0 sweep to clinch its second WNBA title.

2017 RESULTS VS. ATLANTA

Seattle 86, Atlanta 91 - KeyArena (6/13/17)

The Seattle Storm returned home from a three-game road trip for a Tuesday night clash with the Atlanta Dream at KeyArena in rematch of last year's first-round playoff game. The game was one of the most exciting of the young WNBA season, as the two teams needed an overtime period to settle things. At the end, Atlanta came out with a 91-86 road victory. Jewell Loyd opened the game by scoring the first nine points for Seattle, and assisting on the next two buckets to tie the game at 13 apiece. She ultimately tied a season high with 27 points, 16 of which came in the first half. A Jordan Hooper corner three gave Atlanta a 27-20 lead in the second quarter, which was quickly cut to 27-23 when Sue Bird responded by swishing a trey ball of her own with 6:30 remaining in the half. Atlanta's lead would swell to as many as 10 points in the first half. Damiris Dantas' jumper with 2:36 left gave the Dream a 41-31 lead. Seattle (5-5) made the score close (42-38) entering halftime thanks to a 7-1 run to close out the second quarter. After the break, a Crystal Langhorne bucket gave Seattle a 46-44 lead, its first since the Storm led 4-0 in the game's opening sequences. The third quarter came to a close with the Dream clinging to a five-point lead (62-57) thanks to a Meighan Simmons three pointer from the top of the key. A three pointer by Dantas ballooned Atlanta's fourth quarter lead to eight points (67-59) with 7:53 to play. Alysha Clark scooped in a layup at the 6:27 mark of the fourth quarter to bring the Storm within six points (69-63). Later, Loyd sunk a free throw with 1:42 to go to cut the deficit to three (76-73). With the score at 77-75 and just 37.3 seconds left in regulation, Loyd drove hard to the basket and drew a foul on Atlanta's Matee Ajavon. Loyd calmly buried both foul shots, her 13th and 14th of the night, to even things up at 77. With 20.6 seconds remaining, Seattle inbounded the ball with a chance to win the game. As time expired, Loyd hoisted a contested shot that went begging, sending the Storm to its first overtime game of the season. Bird drilled a three on Seattle's first possession to make it 80-79 Seattle, but the Storm came up empty on its next six possessions. Bria Holmes went 7-for-8 from the line in the overtime period, and Atlanta ultimately found itself with an 86-80 lead. A layup from Clark brought the Storm to within two (86-84) in the game's final seconds. After two Noelle Quinn free throws carved Atlanta's lead to 87-86, Breanna Stewart was called for a clear path foul and the Dream was able to seal the game at the free throw line, winning 91-86. Stewart added 16 for the Storm, while Langhorne booked her first double-double of the year with 10 points and 10 boards. For Atlanta (5-4), Dantas registered a career-high 22 points and season-high six rebounds.

LAST GAME

Seattle 79, Connecticut 83 - KeyArena (7/12/17)

The Seattle Storm set a franchise record for the most points (33) scored in the second quarter, but the Sun came out on top by a score of 83-79. Breanna Stewart scored notching 22 points on 10-for-17 shooting to go along with a team-high eight rebounds. Jewell Loyd had 17 points of her own and contributed with six assists. Sue Bird played her way to 15 points and seven dimes, and her teammate Crystal Langhorne made every one of her field goal attempts (5-for-5) to finish with 12 points. Seattle (8-10) turned the ball over on six of its first seven possessions, allowing Connecticut (10-7) to start with a 9-3 lead. The run for the Sun eventually reached 13-5 on a Jasmine Thomas jump shot with 4:39 on the first quarter clock. Connecticut's lead grew to 20-9 under the two-minute mark as Jonquel Jones sank two free throws. Shekinna Stricklen buried a pull-up three to stretch her team's lead to 12 points (30-18), the biggest gap of the game. Stewart responded with a three of her own on Seattle's side of the court. By the 5:56 juncture of the second quarter, the Storm climbed to within five points (32-27) thanks to three straight buckets from Stewart and a layup from Carolyn Swords. Seattle enjoyed a 19-6 run in the second quarter to take its first lead of the game (37-36) with 3:34 to go in the half. Seattle's lead would reach as much as six points in the first half (44-38). The score at halftime read 48-44 in favor of the Storm, with Seattle scoring 33 points in the second quarter, setting a new season-high for points in a quarter. The Storm shot 19-for-30 (63.3 percent) before the break, helping it set a new season-high for points in the first half and first-half field goal percentage. Seattle recorded assists on 15 (78.9 percent) of its 19 made buckets. Connecticut shot 15-for-33 from the field (45.5 percent) prior to halftime. After turning the ball over six times in the first quarter, Seattle coughed it up just once in the second. The Storm shot 12-for-15 (80 percent) on second quarter field goals to propel the team into the lead. Connecticut regained the lead when Stricklen nailed a three to put the team ahead 58-56 just past the halfway mark of the third quarter. The score would even up at 60 with 2:51 on the clock when Bird knocked in two free throws. At the end of three, the Sun held a slim 65-63 advantage. Later, Bird checked in with her 15th point on a jump shot at the 6:14 mark, bringing Seattle within three (74-71). A lefty layup from Stewart put her at 22 points and cut Connecticut's lead to a margin of one (78-77) at the fourth quarter's 3:19 moment. Neither team would score until the 1:08 juncture, when Stricklen converted her career-best seventh three of the afternoon to put the Sun up 81-77. Loyd scored with just 31.2 showing on the scoreboard, bringing Seattle back within two points (81-79). After getting a defensive stop Seattle called a timeout and readied itself for a possible game-tying possession. Stewart was whistled for an offensive foul, and the Storm fouled Williams with 9.4 seconds left. She made both foul shots to secure a four-point (83-79) final score. The Storm had four players eclipse 15 points (Stewart, Loyd, Bird, Langhorne). Stricklen ended with 21, with all of her points coming on three pointers. Every member of Connecticut's starting five posted double-digit scoring numbers.

PREVIOUS GAME

Seattle 81, Los Angeles 69 - KeyArena (7/8/17)

Head coach Jenny Boucek and the Seattle Storm played arguably their best game of the season to beat defending WNBA champion Los Angeles by a score of 81-69. Breanna Stewart put up 26 points, seven rebounds and three steals. Jewell Loyd returned to form offensively, scoring 22 points. Sue Bird captained the offense to the tune of 15 points. Balance was the name of the game for Seattle early. In the game's first five minutes, each of the Storm starters scored and the team made six of its first nine field goals (66 percent). Los Angeles came out of the gates with an 18-13 run. Nneka Ogumike sparked the offense with 10 points, hitting all three of her field goals and all three of her free throws before being subbed out at the 2:13 mark. The Storm (8-9) trailed 21-15 at the end of the first quarter. Alysha Clark garnered her 500th WNBA rebound, just two games after notching 1,000 career points. Seattle reclaimed the lead (30-29) on a Stewart three off a Bird assist with the clock showing 5:18. This marked an 11-0 run for the home team. The unanswered point streak ended at 13 for Seattle when Jantel Lavender knocked down a midrange jumper to make the score 32-31 in favor of the Storm. Los Angeles clung to a slim 39-37 lead at halftime. The Sparks' lead got as high as 10 points in a first half that featured nine lead changes and six ties. Over half of Seattle's first half shot attempts (16-of-31) came in the post. Parker and Ogumike controlled the glass for LA, each pawing five boards, equaling 71 percent (10-of-14) of the team's total rebounds. Stewart supplied Seattle with its first lead of the second half (45-43) by swishing a three pointer. Two free throws from Stewart gave her team a 49-44 advantage. The lead would grow to 53-46 after Stewart made two more foul shots. Los Angeles (12-5) was able to get within eight points (75-67) under two minutes, but that was as close as the Storm would allow. Seattle's starting five combined to shoot 17-for-18 from the charity stripe (94.4 percent). Three-point shooting provided the difference in this game. Seattle was successful on 8-for-15 (53.3 percent) while holding Los Angeles to just 4-for-23 (17.3) from long range. As a team, the Sparks had a 37.1 shooting percentage (26-for-70) for the game. Seattle was able to get the win despite getting zero points from its bench players. Ogumike finished with 21, the high watermark for Los Angeles. The big three of Stewart, Loyd, and Bird shot a collective 22-for-35 (62.8 percent) and netted 63 of Seattle's 81 points.

In the 2017 WNBA Draft presented by State Farm, the Storm selected Alexis Peterson (15th pick, Syracuse) in the second round, followed by Lanay Montgomery (30th pick, West Virginia) in the third round. The all-time assist leader at Syracuse and reigning ACC Player of the Year, Peterson served as the floor general for the Orange, totaling 1,978 points and 590 assists to cap her career. Montgomery, a 6-5 center, averaged 10.6 points, 8.9 boards and 2.8 blocks per game in 2016-17 on the way to leading the Mountaineers to their first Big 12 Tournament title.

ANYTHING YOU CAN DO...

Breanna Stewart notched 2016 WNBA Rookie of the Year honors to cap her inaugural professional campaign and help Seattle become the first franchise in league history to garner back-to-back Rookie of the Year honorees (Jewell Loyd, 2015). In addition to posting 12 double-doubles, Stewart averaged a team-high 18.3 points and 9.3 rebounds to carry the Storm to its first playoff appearance since 2013.

FLYING UP THE RANKINGS

In 2017, Sue Bird has already moved up two spots in the all-time rankings for points. With a 10-point performance at San Antonio, which was also her first double-figure effort in 2017, Bird passed Katie Douglas to climb to the 10th spot. Two days later, she netted a season-high 11 at Indiana to pass DeLisha Milton-Jones to scoot to No. 9 in the rankings. Bird currently has 5,696 points for her career and needs 304 more to become the eighth player in WNBA history to eclipse the 6,000-point mark. On the year, Bird is averaging 10.8 points per game.

BIRD: RECORD WATCHING

Entering today's contest, Sue Bird sits only four steals away from reaching 600, as well as 304 points from becoming the eighth player in WNBA history to eclipse the 6,000-point total. The 36-year-old is the oldest active player in the league, and in her 16th season with the Storm, Bird needs only 81 more dimes to pass Ticha Penicheiro as the WNBA's career assist leader.

ONE OF THE ALL-TIME BEST DISHIN' THE ROCK

Sue Bird is just 81 assists shy of passing Ticha Penicheiro (2,599) on the WNBA all-time assist rankings. She boasts a 5.4 assist per game career average, sitting in second place on the all-time list. Bird led the league in dimes per game in 2016, dishing out 5.8 en route to the WNBA Peak Performer award in the category.

SHE'S A THIEF

Now in her 16th season in the WNBA, Sue Bird is eighth in career steals with 595. She averages 1.3 steals per game for her career, which included one season missed due to injury. In eight of the 14 years she played, Bird recorded 1.4 or more steals per contest. Her 592 career steals rank fourth among active players, and there's a good chance she moves up on the all-time list this year.

SEATTLE ADDS A SWORD(S)

Seattle's frontline got a lot taller in late January thanks to the acquisition of 6-6 center Carolyn Swords. The Storm traded its sixth and 18th picks in the 2017 WNBA Draft with Washington to get the Boston College graduate out to Seattle. The Mystics, as part of the three-way swap, sent Kia Vaughn and Bria Hartley to New York. In her final season with the Liberty, Swords averaged a career-best 5.2 points and 4.6 rebounds per game while shooting 57 percent from the floor.

BACK FOR SECONDS

In 2016, Breanna Stewart simply shattered the Storm's all-time rookie records, and the New York native is poised to carry the momentum over to her sophomore campaign. The reigning WNBA Rookie of the Year and All-WNBA Second Team selection, Stewart set Storm rookie records for points (621), field goals (208), rebounds (317) and minutes (1,179), and she also tied the single-season block record with 64. Stewart scored 20+ points in 15 games, including a historic, single-record tally of 38 vs. Atlanta on June 28, 2016.

A SHINY, NEW JEWELL

Jewell Loyd's jump from her rookie campaign to year two in the WNBA paid dividends in Seattle's late-season push for its 11th playoff appearance in franchise history. Loyd's points-per-game average jumped 5.8 points (from 10.7 to 16.5), and she also nearly doubled her assist average to 3.4 per contest in 2016. Loyd's game-winner at Phoenix snapped a nine-game losing streak to the Mercury and gave Seattle its first win of the 2016 season, and she later netted a career-high 32 points in a 14-point win over the Mercury on June 3, 2016.

HOME, SWEET HOME

On Feb. 8, 2017, Seattle inked sharpshooter Sami Whitcomb to its training camp roster, allowing the former University of Washington standout to return to Seattle. With five years of international experience, Whitcomb has most recently played for the Perth Lynx in Australia, where she totaled 24.0 points, 5.4 rebounds and two assists per game. While playing for the Huskies during her college career, Whitcomb led the team in scoring (13.0 PPG), rebounds (5.6 RPG) and assists (2.5 APG).

STORM TRIO COLLECTS POSTSEASON AWARDS

Seattle boasted the most players on the 2016 All-WNBA First and Second Teams, highlighted by Sue Bird's first team recognition and recipient of the Peak Performer Award as the league leader in assists (5.8 per game). Breanna Stewart (18.3 PPG, 9.3 RPG) was named the 2016 Rookie of the Year, and both she and Jewell Loyd (16.5 PPG, 3.4 APG) earned second team recognition. Together, the trio accounted for nearly 59 percent of the team's offense and 66 percent of its team assists.

THE BIG 2-5

In the first three games of the 2017 campaign, Jewell Loyd recorded at least 25 points in each contest, all of which she accomplished on 55.6 percent shooting or better. She hit 10 field goals in each game, and on May 21 vs. Washington, she went 10-for-14 from the floor for a 71.4 percent clip. She now has five 25-point games in 2017.

PLAYER NOTES

MIGHT WANT TO GUARD LANG

Crystal Langhorne sits second all-time on the WNBA's field goal percentage charts. A career 56.9 percent shooter, Langhorne has led the Storm in scoring twice since joining the team and in consecutive seasons (2014, 2015).

LOYD JOINS 1,000-POINT CLUB

On May 21 against Washington at KeyArena, Jewell Loyd scored her 1,000th-career point in just her third pro season. The bucket came amidst a furious Seattle run in the third quarter, as she nailed a step-back jumper with 31.9 seconds left. The former Notre Dame standout has simply changed the complexion of the Storm this season, averaging 26 points per game and shooting 60 percent (30-for-50) from the field.

RETURNING TO THE NEST

In her 16th season with the Storm, Sue Bird made her return to the lineup on May 21 against the Washington Mystics after missing the first two games of the season. A 2016 All-WNBA First Team selection, Bird picked up right where she left off from last season, tallying nine points and a game-high 10 assists in 29 minutes of action. At age 36, Bird is the oldest active player in the league.

EN FUEGO FROM THE GET-GO

For the sixth time in her career on June 13 against the Atlanta Dream, Jewell Loyd netted at least 15 first-half points, as she recorded 16 points in the opening 20 minutes. She's done it three times in 2017 - On May 21 vs. Washington, Loyd posted 17 points in 16 minutes on 6-for-8 shooting, including a 2-for-2 effort from downtown. In the season opener at Los Angeles on May 13, she scored 18 in the first half and finished the contest with a game-high 25 points

MUST BE A NEW YORK THING

Two former UCONN standouts and New York natives in Sue Bird and Breanna Stewart teamed up for double-doubles in an eight-point Storm loss at New York on June 11. Bird earned her 22nd-career double-double with 21 points and 10 dimes, which were also season-high efforts for the 16-year veteran. Despite fouling out midway through the fourth quarter, Stewart notched 23 points and 10 rebounds in the losing effort.

STEWIE'S 20 & 10

Breanna Stewart has recorded six games this season with at least 20 points and 10 rebounds, with her most recent performance coming on July 6 vs. New York, where she scored 20 points to go along with 14 rebounds. On July 1, she posted a 30-point, 10-board double-double at Dallas. As a rookie in 2016, Stewart eclipsed the 20-10 mark twice, and she now has 17 double-doubles for her career.

BIRD CATCHES 10TH ALL-STAR BID

Sue Bird was named to her 10th WNBA All-Star game, tying the league record held by Tamika Catchings. Bird also received the honor of being named a starter in the game, which will be the eighth time in her 16 seasons that she is on the court at tipoff of the All-Star game. After already passing 2,500 career assists this season, the 16-year veteran needs only 81 dimes to pass Ticha Penicheiro and become the league's all-time assist leader.

STEWIE COMES IN CLUTCH

Breanna Stewart's late-game heroics were what ultimately sealed the deal for Seattle in its home-opening win vs. Indiana on May 14. Stewart grabbed a key offensive rebound before nailing the go-ahead three-pointer with 1:40 left to play, and she went on to drop a dime to Crystal Langhorne to make it a four-point game before coming up with a huge rejection at the 24.9 mark. Stewart battled through foul trouble and registered 15 points and seven rebounds.

WHITCOMB'S 15 MINUTES OF FAME

Prior to the May 26 meeting with New York, Sami Whitcomb had only seen action in a total of nine minutes. But Seattle needed the former University of Washington to defeat the Liberty, as she scored 22 second-half points to anchor a big Storm comeback from 10 down. Whitcomb buried six treys during that stretch, which tied a WNBA record for the most three's made by a player in one half.

LET ME LEND YOU A DIME

While Sue Bird is closing in on the all-time assist record in WNBA history, other Storm players like Jewell Loyd are eclipsing their own milestones. On June 6 in an 85-76 win over San Antonio, Loyd recorded a season-high six dimes, including assist No. 200 for her career, which she notched at the 9:07 mark of the third quarter on a pass to Breanna Stewart. Loyd also reached the 1,000-point milestone earlier this season on May 21.

LOYD'S 3-POINT REVOLUTION

It's no question that Jewell Loyd's shooting ability has improved significantly since her rookie season. In fact, it took just five games for the former Notre Dame superstar to surpass her three-point field goal total from her rookie campaign. In 2015, Loyd went 10-for-48 from deep for 20.8 percent. This season, she has made 21 treys from beyond the arc.

BIRD SKIES PAST TINA THOMPSON FOR THREE'S

With a 4-for-5 effort from downtown on June 11 at New York, Bird passed Tina Thompson, a former Storm player, to move to fourth all-time in the WNBA record books for treys made. Bird has gone 749-for-1,948 (38.4 percent) from beyond the arc during her career and needs 81 more three's to pass Becky Hammon in the No. 3 spot. Bird has been one of the most efficient outside shooters, hitting 38.4 percent of her three's, which ties for third all-time in WNBA history.

STEWIE STYMIES THE STARS

In a 75-57 win over San Antonio on June 18, Breanna Stewart took over in the second half, scoring eight straight points to help Seattle turn a six-point lead into a 15-point cushion. She finished with 22 points, as well as a season-high 15 rebounds and career-best five blocks. In the last five games, Stewart is averaging 21.2 points and 9.6 boards per affair. She's notched three double-doubles in 2017 and has 15 for her career.

MILESTONES IN THE LONE STAR STATE

In a win over Dallas Wings on July 1, both Sue Bird and Alysha Clark reached milestones. Bird dished out eight assists on the night on the way to notching her 2,500th-career dime midway through the second frame, while Clark joined the 1,000-point club with a trey in the first half. She is the second Storm player (Jewell Loyd) to reach 1,000 points for her career in 2017.

1-2 PUNCH OF STEWIE, JEWELL

Seattle became the first team to ever notch back-to-back Rookie of the Year honorees when Breanna Stewart earned the nod last season to cap Jewell Loyd's award in 2015. The dynamic duo has led the way for Seattle offensively and makes Seattle one of two (Phoenix) teams in the WNBA to rank in the top 10 in scoring. Stewart is sixth in the league with 19.1 points per game, while Loyd ranks ninth with a 16.9 points per game average.

TEAM NOTES

HOT FINISH TO 2016

The Storm won five of its last six to cap the regular season in 2016 and earn the No. 7 seed in the WNBA Playoffs, its 11th appearance in franchise history. Three of those triumphs came on the road, and Seattle won those five games by an average of 13.8 points. In Seattle's second to last home game, the Storm took down soon-to-be WNBA champion Los Angeles by an 18-point (78-60) margin, as Breanna Stewart led the way with her 15th 20+ point effort of the season. Seattle looked to ride the momentum of last year's finish and carry it over to this season, and the team did just that, notching its best start since the 2010 campaign, a year in which the team won its second WNBA title.

WELCOME HOME

Since its inaugural WNBA season in 2000, the Storm is 11-7 in home openers, including an 9-3 mark in its last 12. Seattle has faced Los Angeles in seven of the 16 home openers, going 3-4 in those games.

ROAD WARRIORS

Although five of Seattle's first six games in 2017 will take place inside the friendly confines of KeyArena, the Storm will face a brutal road slate in August that covers 21,374 miles across six road contests in five different states. Last season, the Storm dropped 10 of 13 road games before fighting back to win three of its last five.

TEMPERING THE FEVER

Seattle accomplished quite a few feats when it toppled Indiana by a 94-70 margin on May 28 at KeyArena. The Storm tied a franchise record for the best single-game field goal percentage (61.4), earned two wins vs. the Fever in Seattle for the first time in franchise history and tied a franchise record for the most points (94) scored against Indiana.

THE POWER OF THREE

In Seattle's 87-81 win over New York on May 26, the Storm matched a franchise high with 14 three-pointers on 14-for-28 shooting. Nine of those 14 came in the second half, as Sami Whitcomb came off the bench to net six treys, which tied a WNBA record for the most three's made in a half by a single player. The last time Seattle hit at least 14 treys came on Sept. 6, 2012 against Tulsa.

TAKING CARE OF THE ROCK

After committing 43 turnovers in its first two contests of the 2017 campaign, the Storm only averaged 12.3 in its next three home wins over Washington (May 21), New York (May 26) and Indiana (May 28). Coincidentally, Sue Bird made her return to the lineup when Seattle's miscues went down, showing just how important the 16-year veteran is to the team.

BEST START SINCE 2010

Seattle opened the 2017 campaign 4-1 to muster its best start since the 2010 campaign, the same year the team went on to win its second WNBA title. After losing at Los Angeles in the season opener on May 13, Seattle averaged 87.3 points in its next four victories.

STORM RISES TO NO. 7 IN AP POWER POLL

In the ninth Associated Press (AP) Power Poll, and the Storm moved up one spot to seventh and currently holds a 3-8 record against the teams ranked above it in the poll.

STORM SPLITS WITH MERCURY IN PRESEASON

The Storm split its 2017 preseason slate with the Phoenix Mercury, notching a 22-point (86-64) win in Seattle on May 3 before dropping a 17-point (72-55) decision on the road. Jewell Loyd led Seattle offensively, averaging 13.5 points and shooting a perfect 10-for-10 from the free throw line. Adding a spark off the bench, Sami Whitcomb netted 27 total points in the two games, including six three's.

REACHING NEW HEIGHTS

The Storm's 86 total points in the preseason opener vs. Phoenix set a franchise record for the most points tallied in a preseason game. After leading by only eight (39-31) at halftime, Seattle shot 51.3 percent (20-for-39) in the second half and outscored the Mercury by 14 in the final 20 minutes to seal an 86-64 victory. Seattle improved to 19-25 in preseason games, including a 12-9 mark at KeyArena.

FREE POINTS MAKE A DIFFERENCE

If Seattle has proved anything thus far in 2017, it's that it can beat teams at the charity stripe. In the home opener vs. Indiana on May 14, the Storm outscored the Fever by 11 at the line. Freebees came up big two weeks later in a showdown with New York, as Seattle outscored the Liberty, 25-10, at the line to seal an 87-81 win. The Storm has shot a league-best 88.2 percent from the line in 2017.

BACK ABOVE .500

With an 81-71 win over Washington on May 21, the Storm moved above .500 for the first time since June 6, 2015. Seattle had posted losing records in both 2015 and 2016, and the Storm is currently two games below .500 with a 8-10 record.

TEAM NOTES

ANY GIVEN NIGHT...

Seattle head coach Jenny Boucek pointed out that any player on the Storm roster can explode on any given night, and that has certainly been the indication this season. In a come-from-behind win over New York on May 26, Sami Whitcomb erupted for 22 points, all of which came in the second half. Alysha Clark scored a season-high 22 points in a 24-point win over Indiana. While she didn't earn game-high honors, Crystal Langhorne has booked two 17-point performances in 2017 and anchored the team twice, and Jewell Loyd has led the team in scoring five times. Breanna Stewart has also tallied team-high honors for points six times in 2017.

IT TAKES A TEAM EFFORT

In an 89-69 win at Dallas on July 1, the Seattle Storm tied a franchise high with 29 assists on the way to welcoming the new month with a win. Seattle hit 56.9 percent of its field goals, nailing 37 buckets out of 65 attempts - its second best shooting effort of the season. Sue Bird led the way with eight dimes, while Alysha Clark added five assists.

STORM'S DYNAMITE SECOND QUARTER

Despite dropping a 83-79 decision to Connecticut on July 12, Seattle posted the best second quarter in franchise history, tallying 33 points. Seattle shot 80 percent from the floor, 83.3 percent from three and 100 percent from the line in the second quarter, marking the 10th time in league history that a team has shot 80 percent from both the floor and from deep, and connected on a perfect 100 percent from the stripe in a single quarter.

STORM SENDS SPARKS FLYING...AGAIN

On July 8, Seattle defeated defending WNBA champion Los Angeles at home for the fifth straight time, a winning streak dating back to 2015. Breanna Stewart and Jewell Loyd led the way with 26 and 22 points, respectively. The Storm posted 2-0 records at home vs. Los Angeles in both 2015 and 2016 and its win on Sept. 11, 2016 helped the team secure a spot in the 2016 WNBA Playoffs.

LIVIN' THE DREAM

Seattle has posted a winning percentage of .700 (7-3) vs. the Atlanta Dream at KeyArena since the Dream joined the league in 2008. The Storm had won four straight games between 2013-16 before suffering a 91-86 overtime setback on July 13.

JENNY BOUCEK BIOGRAPHY

JENNY BOUCEK

On Jan. 20, 2015, Jenny Boucek was named the fourth head coach in the history of the Seattle Storm and immediately set about rebuilding the team. In her two seasons at the helm, she coached consecutive WNBA Rookie of the Year winners in Jewell Loyd (2015) and Breanna Stewart (2016).

Following a 10-24 campaign in 2015 with a roster that featured three rookies, Boucek's 2016 Storm improved to 16-18 for the franchise's first 15+ win season and playoff berth since 2013. Immediately prior to becoming the team's head coach, she spent four seasons with the Storm under then-head coach Brian Agler, rejoining the defending WNBA champions in 2010 as Dir. of Player Development and Scouting. She was promoted to associate head coach in 2014.

Boucek has been involved in the WNBA since it's inaugural season, suiting up for the Cleveland Rockers in 1997. Following a career-ending injury in 1998, she began her WNBA coaching career as an assistant with the Washington Mystics in 1999. She then spent three seasons, 2000-02, in the same capacity with the Miami Sol. Boucek enjoyed her first stint in Seattle on Anne Donovan's staff from 2003-05, a span which included the franchise's first WNBA Championship in 2004. Her first stop as a WNBA head coach came in Sacramento, leading the now-defunct Sacramento Monarchs to a 40-41 clip over two-plus seasons, spanning 2007-09.

Notably respected as one of the top coaches in the league, Boucek has spent much of her career as a student of the game. She served as an advanced scout with the Seattle SuperSonics, and more recently, had full access to Dallas Mavericks Head Coach Rick Carlisle's training camp in September and October of 2014. She was involved in all coaches meetings, film and practice sessions and player meetings.

Boucek also played in Iceland in 1998 and was voted the country's best player after averaging 23 points, seven rebounds and six assists. She returned to Cleveland for the 1998 season but was forced to retire due to a career-ending back injury.

A four-year starter at the University of Virginia (1992-96), Boucek helped lead the Cavaliers to four regular-season ACC Championships and three NCAA Elite Eight appearances. She was a two-time GTE Academic All-American team member and two-time ACC selection. Boucek twice earned team Defensive Player of the Year honors and finished her career at Virginia as a member of the 1,000-point club. She also competed in the U.S. Olympic Festival in 1993.
